EXPECTS TO SAVE
\$100,000,000 YEAR

Pres. Taft Outlines Policy of Economy

But Announces That Two Battleships a Year Will be Laid Down Until Canal is Completed.

NEWARK, N. J., Feb. 23.—President Taft, the first chief executive to visit Newark since Grant, tonight addressed one of the largest and most enthusiastic dinner audiences he has met in all his travels. The banquet was tendered the President by the Newark Board of Trade and more than 800 members and guests were gathered about long tables in Krueger's Auditorium.

Mr. Taft took for his theme, the homely subject of governmental economy and discussed the efforts being made by his administration to cut down appropriations wherever possible. The president said that he shared the hope that the commission which is to be appointed to revise business methods of the big departments at Washington, may effect a saving approximately \$100,000,000 a year.

The president decided to some extent wherein the decrease in appropriations are to be.

Speaking of the navy, he said it had been decided to continue the policy of two big battleships a year, up to the time the Panama Canal is completed.

That waterway will double the effective field of the navy and Mr. Taft said it would then be time to consider a decrease in the programme.

President Taft came to Newark this afternoon by automobile from New York. From the suburbs of Harrison, into the heart of this city, he passed through dense crowds which the police had some difficulty in handling. Hundreds of persons crowded about the open automobile in which the president was riding with former Governor Franklin Murphy, seeking to shake hands with him.

At Harrison, the school children halted the President's car and one little fellow made a patriotic speech. Mr. Taft responded by thanking the children for their welcome.

Senators Lodge, of Massachusetts, Governor Fort of New Jersey, and the President were the principal speakers at the banquet.

The guest list was a long one, including many of the prominent men of the state.

BRINGS COUNTER CHARGES

IN NOTORIOUS CASE

Mrs. Shaw, Who Elected With Chaffour,

Now Suing Her Husband for Divorce.

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—Mrs. Nettie E. Shaw, wife of Jas. F. Shaw of Boston, a former Massachusetts State Senator, has filed a counter suit for absolute divorce. This was disclosed in New York today by the fact that counsel for Mrs. Shaw have obtained a deposition from a bellboy at a New York apartment hotel, where the co-respondent, whom Mrs. Shaw will name, has resided.

Senator Shaw, it will be recalled, filed suit for divorce against his wife, naming as co-respondent, H. Keno Marbie, a chauffeur, with whom Mrs. Shaw is alleged to have eloped to California in the summer of 1908. A year later Senator Shaw traced his wife to a boarding house in Santa Barbara, it is alleged, and took forcible possession of his son, Eldridge, ten years old. Then he filed suit for divorce.

Mrs. Shaw's counter action is expected to come to trial next month in Boston.

PROF. BOWSER PASSES AWAY

Noted Mathematician Was a Native of Sackville—The St. Croix River.

BOSTON, Feb. 23.—A cable from Honolulu announces the death, of Professor Edward Albert Bowser, noted mathematician. Prof. Bowser was born at Sackville, N. B., in 1845 and was graduated in 1868. From 1868 to 1870 he was professor of mathematics and engineering at Rutgers, his alma mater. He was the author of "Arithmetic Algebra" and many standard scientific works.

CHARGES LAURIER

WITH DISLOYALTY

Reckless Statements of Dr. Edwards Concerning French in Quebec—Contradicted by Fellow Conservatives

OTTAWA, Feb. 24.—Continuation of a debate in Commons yesterday brought forth some very reckless statements from Dr. Edwards of Frontenac. The member proceeded to upbraid the government. He said that the policy of Sir Wilfrid, as a representative of the French Canadians, was disloyal. He charged that there was an anti-British and anti-imperial sentiment in Quebec.

The speaker was interrupted by Dr. Faquet, a Conservative member from Quebec, who brought him to task for his statements.

Dr. Edwards thought there should be a direct contribution of Frenchness to the British navy.

Hardly had the speaker resumed his seat when Dr. Boland arose to contradict the statements concerning the French Canadians. He characterized the remarks as unfair. The French Canadians, he said, feel that Canada should assist in the maintenance of the British navy.

DOCTOR CHARGED WITH POISONING

Boys' Quarrel Ends in Murder and Attempted Suicide

Loses His Life on Second Trial—Mrs. Glover's Threats Revealed—Jury Finds Responsibility for Adams Murder.

KIRKSVILLE, Mo., Feb. 23.—A warrant charging Dr. Chas. R. Hull of Monroe City with murdering Fred J. T. Vaughan by strychnine poisoning was issued tonight by Justice of the Peace J. P. Carothers at the request of Prosecuting Attorney Reiger. Dr. Hill is in Montgomery City.

WATERTOWN, Mass., Feb. 23.—A quarrel late tonight between three boys and some Armenians who are employed by Andrew Lamplier, a milkman at 288 Arsenal street, resulted in the death of James O'Brien, aged 17 years, and the arrest of Gabriel O'Brien, aged 29 years, who is charged with manslaughter.

O'Brien attempted unsuccessfully to commit suicide soon after being placed in a cell at police headquarters. NEW YORK, N. Y., Feb. 23.—It would have been better for Edward P. McGrath, laborer, if he had not had a second trial. A jury today convicted him of murder in the first degree, and he will go to the electric chair. At his first trial two weeks ago, the verdict was murder in the second degree, which means life imprisonment. But as is the usual custom, McGrath's counsel made a motion for a new trial and Justice Goff unexpectedly granted it. He refused to entertain such a motion after the second conviction today.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Feb. 23.—The declaration by a woman witness that she had heard Mrs. Lillian M. Glover threaten to buy a revolver in order to kill her husband brought to a sensational close today's session of the murder of William Lamplier. The statement of the threat was made by Mrs. Kate Sampson of Auburndale, Mass., a "half" aunt of Miss Leblanc and also a distant relative of the widow.

Mrs. Sampson said the relations between Mr. and Mrs. Glover were not pleasant. Her testimony was still uncompleted. The O'Brien murder case will continue tomorrow afternoon.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Feb. 23.—William S. Seyler, agent, was charged with the responsibility for the death of Jane Adams by the coroner's inquest. The evidence presented was directly in line with that already known.

The police authorities made no attempt to place either of the Seyler brothers on the stand tonight during the inquest, and the evidence presented was directly in line with that already known.

William Seyler was then held without bail for the grand jury May term. Orville Seyler, his brother, was held in \$2,000 bail, but was unable to furnish this sum, and will be forced to remain in jail.
