The lecturer had said the people of penmark, Germany and Belgium were more advanced than Candhians, be-cause they elected labor representa-tives and adopted old age pensions and a few labor laws. Well, the people of those countries were glad to come to Canada and get a job' at \$6 a week. When conditions were as bad here as in Germany or England, we would be given old age pensions too. Lloyd George was a poor kind of a hero. Old age pensions were not a cure for poverty. The average length of the life of the workingman was only 27 years. An old age pen-sion 33 years after he was dead wasn't much good to the average working-man.






