

FUNERAL OF FRANK CONNOLLY

Many beautiful floral tributes show high esteem in which deceased was held.

The sincere sympathy of a host of friends, and the popular esteem in which he was held were attested yesterday morning when a large gathering assembled at the funeral of Frank Connolly, conducted from his late home, 294 Princess street, to the cathedral, where high mass of requiem was celebrated by his cousin Rev. D. S. O'Keefe of Kingslear, assisted by Rev. C. J. McLaughlin, as deacon; Rev. M. O'Brien as sub-deacon, and Rev. Wm. Duke as master of ceremonies. The body was taken to the new Catholic cemetery, where it was interred with prayer at the grave recited by Father O'Keefe.

The funeral was attended by a great number, and was particularly lengthy. The pall-bearers were: Urban Kelly, Wm. Rhea, LeBaron Driscoll, Frank Casey, E. J. Cronin, J. J. McManus, Herbert O'Neill and T. J. McManus. Members of St. John Council, Knights of Columbus, attended in a body, and a delegation from the Irish Literary and Benevolent Society was present. Mr. Connolly was a popular favorite in both societies. The members of Moncton Council, 1510, Knights of Columbus, also showed their sympathy in sending a delegation to attend the funeral. Mrs. Lella Y. Post, widow of the late Charles W. Post, the cereal manufacturer, and Marjorie Post Close, a daughter, will receive the bulk of Mr. Post's estate, which he valued at \$20,000,000. Mr. Post's last will and testament was filed in Washington for probate. Ten per cent of his personal estate was willed to his granddaughters, Adelaide and Elinor Close. Mr. Post committed suicide in his home in Santa Barbara, Cal., May 8 last, by shooting himself through the head. He had been ill and was operated upon in a sanitarium in Battle Creek, Mich., several weeks before, but was convalescing at the time he took his life. Mr. Post was well known all over the United States and Europe.

In Chambers.
