## MEMORIAL SERVICE FOR PTE. W. N. BELVEA

Heroic Young Soldier Who Left St. John With 55th and Met Death in Action on June 3rd.

A memorial service was held in St. Matthew's Presbyterian church, yesterday morning for Private Nobles Belvea, who left St. John with the 55th Battalion, was afterwards transferred to another unit, and was killed in action on June 3. The choir provided suitable music and the church was filled with white flowers provided by

the Young People's Society. The acting minister, Rev. John Hardwick, read the funeral service, and in his remarks said: Private Belvea was the first of the long honor roll of the church to pay the supreme sacrifice. His remarks were based on St. Paul's vision of the man of Macedonia, saying to him, "Come Over and Help Us." Millions of the young men of the Empire were seeing visions, visions of martyred Belgium, of British freedom, of Canada and her peace loving people, and the nightmare vision of what German militarism means. Private Belvea heard the cry of humanity and of Britain "Come Over and Help Us," he donned the khaki and obeyed the vision. In the course of time he reached the firing line. He was one of millions of the common soldiers, he won no medals, received no promotions, was mentioned in no despatches, but he was faithful unto death, and consequently he had received before this a higher than any earthly honor, a crown of life.

Presentation to Imperial Boys.

Before the commencement of the second show at the Imperial Saturday night two members of the orchestra, H. Williams, string bass, and George Buckle, trombone, were called to the front of the stage by the manager, W. H. Golding, where on behalf of the Imperial employees they were presented with pipes and pouches and fountain pens. Each was also presented with a bouquet for his wife and a box of confectionery for their children. The members having enlisted in the 115th and 140th Battalion bands.

This makes nineteen of the Imperial staff of twenty-two males, who have enlisted since the commencement of the war. Seventeen have already seen active service, one of whom has made the supreme sacrifice. Another employee has been wounded.

The depletion in the staff has been filled by incapacitated men and lady ushers of the Y. W. P. A.  
During the presentation the orchestra played "They Are Jolly Good Fellows." After which the audience gave the men a grand ovation.

## INSPECTION OF CADETS AT ROTHESAY

Inspector Black of Halifax Visited Rothesay College on Saturday Afternoon—Boys Made Good Showing.

The inspection of the Rothesay Cadets by Inspector Black of Halifax took place on Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock on the school grounds.

There was quite a large gathering of the friends and relatives of the boys to greet the inspector and although the weather looked threatening for a time the inspection was carried through amid the pleasant surroundings of Rothesay scenery.

The corps consisting of about 70 boys were lined up in charge of their instructor, Col. Sgt. Dore and company officers, and on the arrival of the inspector the general salute was given and afterwards the boys marched past in quarter column. The Cadet Corps band added much to the enthusiasm of the boys and was loudly applauded by those present.

The corps was given, as customary with this inspector, a very exhaustive and thorough inspection in every detail of the syllabus which consists of squad and company drill, extended over skirmishing, scouting, signalling, field engineering and physical training exercises.

At the close of the inspection, which occupied about two hours, the boys were treated to a short and instructive address from the inspector.

Amongst other things he said none were more appreciated than the high compliment paid by the inspector to the instructor and the boys with special commendation as to the manner in which the company officers had carried out their portion of the training.

The signalling corps were specially complimented as also the physical training exercises which were exhibited.

Two medals for shooting, one to the senior and one to the junior boys, were also presented and the personal of the target score sheets impressed the inspector with the accuracy of aim and general training in musketry the boys had received.

The inspector also made a very instructive speech as to the objects and advantages of making this great movement compulsory in all the schools, so as to educate the future manhood of the nation in a manner which alone completely fitted them to take up the civil and national responsibilities which this great Empire of ours now demanded.

The inspector pointed out how the Cadets have already figured so prominently in every department of the C. E. F. and had won undying fame and honor on the bloody battlefields of Flanders and Belgium. He claimed the record in this respect demanded from those in authority to see to it that in our great national emergency no opportunity should be lost to fittingly provide for the extension of this great work which is now so meritoriously recognized by the military authorities.

The inspector goes to West St. John this morning and inspects the Martello Tower School at 10 o'clock which has only been recently organized under the personal supervision of the principal, Mr. White, who is also a qualified cadet instructor. This afternoon and evening an inspection will take place at Sunny Brae and Moncton at 3.30 and 7 p. m., respectively.

## LUDLOW ST. BAPTIST S. S. ANNIVERSARY

Yesterday's Services at West End Church Were of Particular Interest—76 Years of Service.

Yesterday was Sunday school day at the Ludlow street Baptist church. They celebrated the 76th anniversary, and all the services of the day were on the Sunday school and its relation to the church work. The first service was held at ten o'clock a. m. and a prayer service, led by Hon. Superintendent Deacon J. F. Ring, at eleven o'clock the pastor, Rev. W. R. Robinson, took as his subject "The Mission of the Sunday School," at 2.15 p. m. the anniversary exercises were held, at seven o'clock Rev. E. C. Jenkins, a former pastor, spoke on "The Sunday School Teachers' Fourfold Responsibility." At the afternoon service honor rolls of superintendents and pastors of the church were unveiled and a picture of Hon. Superintendent Deacon J. F. Ring was presented to the Sunday school. In honor of his having given over fifty years of service to the school. His Worship Mayor Hayes was present and conveyed the greetings of the N. B. and P. E. I. Sunday School Association, of which body he is chairman of the executive. Hon. Superintendent Deacon J. F. Ring gave a very interesting "Glance Back" in which he referred to the growth of the school, and the work which had been done by the past superintendents. The anniversary address was delivered by Rev. E. C. Jenkins, a former pastor of the church. Large numbers were present at all the services and the day was a most pleasant and profitable one. Following is a short history of the school.

1841-1916.  
Ludlow street Baptist Sunday school (then known as the Carleton Baptist Sunday school), was organized during June, 1841, with an enrollment of thirty. John H. Cunneen held the first superintendent. The Sunday school met for some years in the Hall on King street, now known as the W. C. T. U. Hall. About 1850 the Sunday school moved to the present building where it has been meeting every Lord's Day since, and been greatly blessed of the Lord. Four members of the school have been ordained to the Christian ministry as follows: Revs. Perry J. Stackhouse, A. J. Vincent, C. Vincent and J. H. King.

Two of our teachers, L. Geo. H. Estabrooks (home on furlough), and Driver Renwick N. Anderson, are on active service with over fifty others, a large number of whom were regular attendants of the Pastor's Bible Class. The Sunday school has at present an enrollment of 357 (not including a large Craft Hall and Home Dept.). Twenty-four teachers are rendering faithful service. The school raised \$909.96 during the year just ended.
