CROPS LOOKING WELL IN ST. JOHN VALLEY

Hay and Potatoes Very Good—New Potatoes Worth \$9 a Barrel in Fredericton.

Fredericton, July 31.—Reports from different sections in York and Sunbury, and portions of Northumberland Counties, received today, would indicate that the crops, as a whole, are coming along fairly well. Hay promises to be well up to the average crop, especially on dry land. Reports from the river parishes, both in York and in Sunbury Counties, indicate that the crop will be a good one and above the average. Farmers are beginning to hay now in several sections and seem to be encouraged at the outlook. Labor is reported scarce and men for haying are commanding good wages. In some cases as high as four and five dollars per day with board is being paid.

It is expected that potatoes in the St. John valley will be a fairly good yield. New potatoes here are worth \$9.00 a barrel retail.

SOLDIERS' SKULLS OF THE WAR OF 1812

Bones Plowed Up At Niagara Falls, Ont.

Niagara Falls, Ont., July 31.—A plow cutting ground for a new cottage on Delaware Avenue, unearthed two perfect human skulls and several other human bones. As there never was a cemetery at that point, they are believed to be the remains of soldiers who fell in the war of 1812.

TWO MORE BODIES FOUND IN HALIFAX

Halifax, July 31.—The bodies of two men were found at the Sugar Refinery yesterday. On one of the bodies a pocket book with the name of F. P. Huddell was found. The body is presumably that of a steamship man. In the clothing of the other body was found a silver Waltham watch, a gold heart-shaped locket and gold chain. The man had a set of false teeth.

FATAL FIGHT ON STEAMER IN PORT

Chief Officer Donald Shaw Held on a Charge of Manslaughter, But May Be Freed.

Halifax, July 31.—Medical Examiner Finn, after making an examination of the body of Arthur McBride, an officer on a steamship in port here, who died suddenly last night, following a fight with Chief Officer Donald Shaw, of the same steamer, reported today that he had found indications that death was due to natural causes. An autopsy will be held, Shaw, who was arrested last night on a charge of manslaughter, was before Stipendiary McDonald today for preliminary examination. John Sedden, an officer on the same vessel, who was a witness of the fight, testified that he did not think the "scrap" very serious at the time.

He said that McBride was taken violently ill after the combat. He took him on board the ship and, in helping him, smelt liquor on him.

McBride said, however, that McBride was not intoxicated. Other witnesses stated that McBride started the fight. The hearing was adjourned until tomorrow morning.

MONTREAL TRAMWAYS WANTS 7 CENT FARE

Montreal, July 31.—In the course of the proceedings before the Public Utilities Commission today counsel for the Tramways announced that the situation in Montreal demanded a straight seven cent fare, with four tickets for a quarter and free transfers. The commission had previously fixed the tariff, based on increases awarded the employees, at a live cent straight fare, with transfers at one cent each.

The City of Montreal supported by a number of outlying municipalities appealed from this award as being too high, whereupon the company appealed from it as being too low.
