JAPAN'S PLAY ON CHINA IS NOW REVEALED

"Simultaneously the Peking military brought great pressure to bear in presidential quarters, with a view to securing the adoption of the Japanese viewpoint.

According to the reports received at Washington the threats against China have been conveyed to the Chinese foreign minister by the Japanese minister in Peking in thinly veiled terms.

Upon arriving in Paris, without the copies of the treaties which they had been instructed to bring in seeking to break Japan's grip, the Chinese delegates made verbal reports of the substance of these treaties to some of the peace delegates of other countries.

China has asked, depending upon the impression made upon the accredited delegates from the other countries, that the peace conference see the twenty-one demands made upon China by Japan in 1915 be revoked, and that the Chinese republic be moved definitely from the influence of Japan.

need for revenue is not the time to tinker with matters fiscal, but there are others in the cabinet, particularly representatives of the west, who hold altogether different views.

In any case the tariff promises to play a big part in the controversies of the session. The Laurierites will probably open an offensive by moving an amendment to the address in reply to the speech from the throne, demanding abolition of the war tariff increases, and the so-called 'ginger group' led by Col. J. A. Currie, are expected to move a resolution calling for a complete boycott of all German goods.

A number of western unionist members have already arrived for the session. Without exception they declare that Union Government is steadily gaining in strength in the west, and they scout the idea of liberal unionists from the Prairie Provinces deserting the government on the tariff issue.

UNIFORMITY IN M. S. A. SENTENCES

Act Now Before the Cabinet With That Object in View.


