Prominent British Women Present. Among the British delegates well known in America already here are Chrystal McMillan, Mrs. Pettibone Lawrence, Mrs. Dugard, sister of General Sir John French, Dr. Almeta Jacobs, of Holland, and several women from Australia, New Zealand and other British dominions.

Other countries to be represented are Germany, Sweden, Norway, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Luxembourg, Turkey, Serbia, Württemberg and Mecklenburg.

Mrs. Henry Fawcett, a noted British suffrage leader and first vice president of the International Alliance, had been expected to take a leading part, but she declined to come because of ill health, and has sent a challenge to the young to carry on the work of the alliance.

CASE OF THE FRASERS LIMITED VS. EDMUNSTON SCHOOL DISTRICT

The following are the judgments delivered by the members of the Supreme Court of Canada in the case of Frasers, Limited v. The Edmundston School District, a case which has attracted considerable attention, involving, as it does, important considerations as to the exemption of property from assessment for school purposes.

The Chief Justice.—I am of the opinion that the appellant company is not entitled to have its assessment for purposes of school taxation limited as provided for by the New Brunswick statute, 5 Geo. V., c. 104, and the agreement of 1917, confirmed by the Act, 8 Geo. V., c. 66.

The Town of Edmundston has not exceeded the power conferred by section 108 of the School Act (C. S. N. B. 1908, c. 86), to bring itself under the provisions of section 106 of that statute. Section 110, therefore, does not apply to the School District No. 1, of which the Town of Edmundston forms a part.

I agree with the learned Chief Justice of New Brunswick that the assessors pursued a proper and a reasonable course in placing on the property of the appellant its actual or true valuation (in this case \$1,000,000) and appending thereto the appellation "No assessment as per contract with the Town of Edmundston to be reduced to (\$100,000) One Hundred Thousand Dollars."

Nothing was done under the provisions of the Act. It was followed by another Act validating the actual contract which resulted and that validating Act provided as follows: "3. So much of the said Act, 2 Geo. V., chapter 104 as is inconsistent with the provisions of this Act is hereby repealed."


I think the other questions raised in argument are so effectively dealt with by the judgment of the learned Chief Justice, with which I agree, that I need not repeat his reasons here.

I would therefore dismiss this appeal with costs. Duff, J.—It is a settled principle that legislation intended to carry into effect contractual arrangements between local authorities and individuals shall not, unless the language is clear and admits of no doubt, be construed as having collateral effects touching interests outside of those which, as being the interests of the parties immediately concerned, the legislature may be supposed to have had exclusively in view.


