Gagetown, N. B., Sept. 7.—The patriotic meeting held in the court house Tuesday evening, the first of its kind in this town, was a splendid demonstration of the loyalty which is everywhere displayed in Canada today. As the Quebec county court is now in session, the meeting can be said to have been fairly representative of the whole county and the court house was crowded to the limit of its capacity. The speeches of the distinguished gentlemen who addressed the meeting were followed from point to point by general applause. Rev. William Smith, rector of Gagetown, presided, and called upon the following speakers in turn: Chief Justice Landry, Judge Wilson, H. H. Woods, M. P., P. A. B. Sloan, M. P., P. Rev. H. Harrison, S. L. Peters, Rev. Wm. Smith and Judge Wilson rendered patriotic songs which received loud applause, and the audience joined in singing O Canada.

At the conclusion of the meeting measures were taken to provide for a Quebec county patriotic fund. A committee from Gagetown, consisting of Sheriff Williams, R. R. Reid and H. H.
