Glencoe Chautauqua guarantors went back to the extent of \$5 apiece on this season's venture. There were 33 guarantors. Notwithstanding this loss 62 persons signed a contract for next year, which shows that Chautauqua has either taken a firm hold upon the people of this community or they have an optimism that cannot be shaken.

It is advisable and mandatory under section 297 of the Municipal Act for every municipality to adopt an annual budget and to levy taxes sufficient to cover the expenditures fixed by such budget. But it is more important to adhere to the principle of keeping the expenditures well within the limit of the anticipated revenues. No expenditures should be contemplated before the money to pay the same is in some way secured. Every municipality should be run on a cash basis and the running up of overdrafts or floating indebtedness of any kind should be considered a breach of trust on the part of the Government.

Premier Ferguson, who is also Minister of Education, has created the position of Superintendent of Education and is filling it by the appointment of Dr. F. W. Merchant. The Dundas Star refers to this as a good appointment and remarks:—"Dr. Merchant has had charge of the evening technical classes and has made them a practical success. He is a man of exceptional ability, and does not seem to have gotten into the educational rut of thinking that modern and dead languages are the most important subjects in education. It is to be hoped that he can shake up the present high school system so that it will be of more practical benefit to the majority of students attending, and reduce its tendency toward merely providing an academic training for the few who intend to go on to the university. If he can do this the high school course will be of much greater practical benefit, and the school will become much more popular with the

ratepayers. If such an improvement is instituted there will not be such a strong opposition toward a by-law to grant the money necessary for increased accommodation."

One frequently sees advertisements offering a reward for a lost article, and ending with the words "No questions asked." In England this means compounding felony. Sir Henry Lucy in his recently issued volume of reminiscences has an anecdote illustrating the point. A gentleman, well known in London society, had his watch picked from his pocket one night on the way back from the theatre. He advertised, offering a reward and adding "No questions will be asked." Pleased at his own astuteness, he confidently awaited response, and in due time received one, though not from the quarter he expected. The communication, dated from a well-known club, drew the advertiser's attention to the fact that by the terms of his proposal he had been guilty of compounding felony; the statute provided that its penal clauses might be put in operation at the instance of the common informer, who was to be rewarded with payment of £50. The writer admitted that he was "the common informer," and suggested that payment of £50 down would save the advertiser much trouble and expense at the Law Courts. There was no use kicking against the pricks. The advertiser, taking legal advice, found the common informer's position was impregnable, and paid the fine. Nor was this all. The enterprising student of the advertising columns made a similar communication to the proprietor of the newspaper in which the notice had been published, pointing out that he was equally liable, and demanding a second £50. The conclusion was inevitable. The writer of the letter was traced by the address given, and was discovered in the person of a waiter at the club. He was promptly dismissed, but got the solatium of £100.

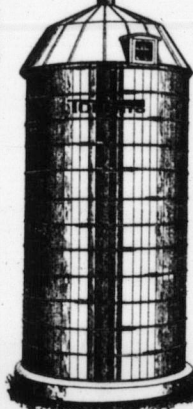
