Man of 80 Will Not Pay Alimony

Asks New York Judge to Send Him to Jail or to the Electric Chair--Declares He Never Married the Woman and That He Would Not Pay Her Counsel Fees.

New York, Nov. 2.—With youthful enthusiasm, Henry Weiss brought his fist down before Supreme Court Justice MacCraty in Brooklyn to-day and issued his ultimatum.

"I cannot pay any alimony to this woman," he announced. "I will not pay it. Send me to the electric chair. Kill me now if you want to. I never married her and I'll never give her a cent."

He shook his head vigorously. As he shook it his flowing white beard waved in the gentle breezes so created. Mr. Weiss is 80 years old.

The court had ordered him to pay \$75 counsel fees and \$5 a week alimony pending the settlement of the suit for separation brought by Mrs. Lena Weiss, 69 years old, of 1908 Third avenue, Brooklyn. Mrs. Weiss charged desertion.

To-day he appeared as counsel for himself. When he insisted that Mrs. Weiss is not his wife Justice MacCraty recalled that a Mrs. Fanny Weiss a year ago brought action to have Weiss' marriage to Mrs. Lena Weiss annulled. Neither plaintiff nor respondent appeared, however, and the marriage was held valid.

"Send me to the electric chair," Weiss pleaded. The Justice declined and repeated his order for payment.

"No," Weiss barked, his beard bristling, "send me to jail. You might just as well save my money. Send me to jail. I won't pay it."

The Justice suggested that Mrs. Weiss would, no doubt, get an order for that if Weiss refused to pay. Weiss again insisted that he be sent to the chair, and when his plea was ignored left indignantly. But before he went, he indignantly denied the aspersions on his wife's counsel that he is only 70 years old.

"I was born in 1845," he said. Then he strode forth into the storm and his beard became full of snow.

AFRICA BELONGS TO THE AFRICAN RACE

Resolutions Passed at Meeting of American Negro Labor Congress.

Chicago, Nov. 2.—Resolutions adopted by the American Negro Labor Congress which the American Federation of Labor has condemned as communistic, assailed the activities of the American flyers against Abd El Krim's defiance. The Lafayette escadrille should be brought back and the United States should abandon its claim to extra-territoriality in Morocco, the negroes declared.

Harvey Firestone's plan of developing rubber growing in Liberia also was denounced by the Congress as a scheme which will benefit only American money lords and cause the negroes of Liberia endless suffering. Africa belonged to the African people and not to "foreign plunderers."

Only Soviet Russia was commended by the forty delegates to the Congress because "the workers' government there is the first to bring into being the full social, political and economic equality for all peoples."

It was voted to send delegates to a world congress of negroes which communists expect to hold in Berlin next year.

CONSTITUTIONAL POINT EXPOUNDED

Authority Says Governor General Cannot Ask for King's Resignation.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—Constitutional history reveals no precedent that would require the King Government to resign as the result of Thursday's election or justify the Governor General in seeking his resignation, according to a distinguished authority on the subject, whose views were sought. Even though the Prime Minister and seven of his colleagues had failed to secure election, he pointed out they were still nominally the servants of the King and removable only at the pleasure of the Crown or its representative.

"As long as the King, or in this case his representative, has confidence in the Commons, and even though they are defeated in a division. Of course, should the Prime Minister retain his position and appear before the House and lose on a question of major policy, then the Governor General would probably decline to accept his advice in future, and make it so uncomfortable for him that he would have to step out," he said.

SAILS 38,000 MILES IN A FRAIL CRAFT

Harry Pidgeon Left California in 1921 and Had Wonderful Trip.

San Pedro, Cal., Nov. 2.—Circumnavigation of the globe in a 34 foot sail boat, has been accomplished by Harry Pidgeon, 54 years old photographer, known to many as the "Library Navigator." He made port here after travelling 38,000 miles in a small cockleshell craft, the Islander, since he set sail from San Pedro, November 16, 1921. The Islander traversed seas notorious for bad weather. Leaving San Pedro she went to the Marquesas Islands, South Sea, to Torres Straits, across the Indian Ocean to Mauritius and then southward to Cape Town. Thence she made St. Helena and crossed the Atlantic to Panama. She left the canal zone last August 7. Pidgeon was dubbed the "Library Navigator" because of the unusual manner in which he obtained his seafaring knowledge. With books from a branch library here he spent what time he could spare from the construction of the Islander in studying navigation. All his information about sailing was acquired in this way.

Booms Welsh Coal



—So good has been the Canadian demand for Welsh hard coal that the British anthracite industry has been saved from the depression which has so notably overtaken British steam coal mining. This statement was made last week at the meeting of the Amalgamated Anthracite Collieries by Sir Alfred Mond.
