

Township Building Figures Sky-Rocket

The fact that Toronto Township is a municipality "on the move" was clearly borne in the building report for the month of May.

For the first five months of this year, new buildings in the township totalled slightly over \$26,700,000 in value as compared with a total of \$10,333,160 for the same period last year.

The most noticeable differences were shown in the housing development, industrial and township building. The residential total up to the end of May this year

reached \$13,306,999 with a whopping \$5,761,327 being recorded in the month of May alone. The 1964 total for the first five months was only \$5,076,587.

This year's industrial total is nearly \$9,000,000 as compared with less than one and a half million in '64.

New township buildings this year reached a total value of \$1,507,000. Last year there was only \$112,600 worth of new municipal buildings in the first five months.

News Of Interest From Library

In case there are some people who think that the books and services of a library are of more interest to women than to men, we are listing some of the books on the shelves of Port Credit Library that appeal to me.

Just inside the door, on the left, is located the biography section. Here will be found many books about men. "Private Shaw and Public Shaw" by Stanley Weintraub is a dual portrait of Lawrence of Arabia and George Bernard Shaw. The author traces the development of the friendship between these two gifted men. Boswell's "Life of Samuel Johnson" has been described as the best biography written, and the library has a modern library edition unabridged and with notes. "The Tiger of Canada West" by W. H. Graham is the story of William Dunlop, an eccentric outsider of civilization, who assisted in the setting up of the Huron Tract, and was a member of the first legislature of Canada.

In the 600 section which is found in the centre of the western part of the building are books on the useful arts. Here are volumes on electricity, engineering, boatbuilding, diving, etc. "The Ancient Engineers" by L. S. DeCamp traces the history of engineering from the dawn of civilization to the 17th century. Here are also cook books, and since there is such a fashion for men to cook, especially outdoor cooking, we recommend "The Barbecue Cook Book" by Sunset Magazine, "How to Sell Cars" by Richard Munro, and "How to be a Successful Retailer in Canada" by Harold Shaffer, are followed by books on building and repairing houses and furniture and

other technical subjects.

In the 700 section are books on fine arts and also sports. Some of the most popular of the latter at this time of year, are books on golf, boating, water skiing, fishing and other summer-time activities.

Travel books are popular with men and these are along the west wall of the library in the 900 section. "Portal to Paradise" by Cecil Roberts, "Personal and Oriental" by Austin Coates, "A Tourist in Africa" by Evelyn Waugh and "Journey into Russia" by Laurens van der Post are a few interesting titles.

In the same vicinity is found the magazine rack. Here one recent copy of a periodical is on display, and behind it the drawer pulls out and back copies are stored inside. "Canada Month", "Saturday Night", "Autocar", "Photography", "New Scien-

\$2,000,000 Addition To Refinery

Oakville based Engineers and Constructors, has been awarded a contract to provide engineering and drafting for a \$2,000,000 Alkylation Unit to be constructed at the BP Trafalgar Refinery.

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Boy, 5, Killed On Lakeshore

A five-year-old Lakeview boy died in the Hospital for Sick Children early Sunday morning just 10 hours after

he had been struck by a car on the Lakeshore highway near his home.

Little Garth Rice, son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Rice, was struck down as he tried to run across the highway near the intersection of Haig Blvd. to join his sister on the other side, police said.

Dr. T. J. McKeown arrived at the scene of the accident and immediately started applying an external heart-

massage and mouth-to-mouth resuscitation when it appeared that the boy had succumbed. The boy revived however, and Dr. McKeown continued to work on him as they were rushed to the South Peel Hospital in Cooksville.

He was transferred to the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto but died early the following morning. He had suffered serious head injuries.

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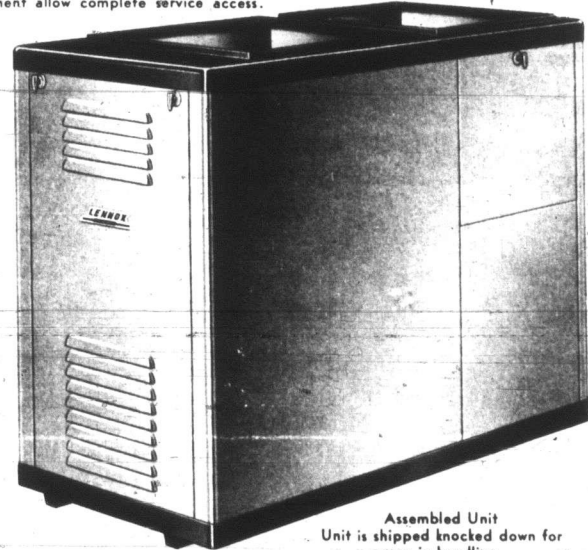
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
