

With this end in view I would suggest that a section 640 acres of land in each Indian Reserve be set apart as a model and stock farm and that a skilful manager be appointed to superintend the same.

In selecting the site it would be necessary to choose a section suitable on account of its proximity to road and water for the purpose.

It might perhaps be difficult to secure the services of a person capable of taking charge of such an undertaking one acquainted with the Indians and their language and at the same time a skilful agriculturist. Accustomed to the ways of the country.

Employment would be given the Indians from the first establishment of such a farm in supplying materials for building and fencing purposes, and afterwards <sup>some of</sup> these would be employed constantly on the farm.

Being promptly paid for such services they would be induced to do whatever was required under the direction of the Superintendent.

It would also be part of the duties of the Superintendent to direct the Indians in planting and cultivating their own plots of land, and advise them as to the management of the same.
