way, which was cancelled by the government of Sir Robert
Borden when it assumed office in that year. In 1925 the
Mackenzie King Government provided for its construction and
passed a bill for this purpose in the House of Commons.
This bill however was defeated by the posservative majority
in the Senate. But the Liberal Government persisted in its
effort and in 1929 made provision for the Guysborough Railway
in the branch lines of the C.N.R. Contractors are now in the
field and the rails are expected to be laid before Autumn of
the present year.

## Cold Storage

In order to provide cold storage facilities at Halifax the Dominion Government offered its co-operation in the construction of a modern cold storage plant at this port. To this end a payment of \$303,750,00 under the Cold Storage Warehouse Act was made in 1929 to the Nova Scotia Public Cold Storage Terminals Limited of Halifax. This represents payment on account of the first installment of the Cold Storage subsidy, being \$15% of the completed construction cost at that date.

Provision has also been made by the Department of
Agriculture for the assistance of a Cold Storage Plant at
Moncton to meet the convenience of New Brunswick and Prince
Edward Island.
