

A-10 Yes, sir.

Q-11 Would you say that the Camp at Espanola is well-lighted?

A-11 Yes, sir.

Q-12 Everywhere?

A-12 I would say it is well lighted, yes.

THE JUDGE ADVOCATE: Now, Mr. Prosecutor, arising out of that cross-examination, you may re-examine if you wish, to qualify or bring out anything explanatory of what has been referred to by the Defending Officer. He addressed his questions to the witness on the question of lighting. Now, having regard to your opening address, there may be something you would like to ask this witness.

THE PROSECUTOR: If I can get this map into position where the Court can see it.

BY THE JUDGE ADVOCATE:

Q-13 Are the streets named?

A-13 Yes, sir.

THE JUDGE ADVOCATE: If they are named, their names should be referred to.

THE PROSECUTOR: Will you indicate to the Court where the Sergeants' Mess is, on this plan?

THE PRESIDENT: I think if you bring it over here (indicating), the accused and his Defending Officer can come up for a moment, until we get this beyond any dispute.

THE JUDGE ADVOCATE: Mr. President, I have a communication from the Editor of the Sudbury Daily Star, requesting that Mr. Jessup be allowed to attend this Court Martial. A Court Martial is an open court, and the public and press are entitled to be present, except where the charge or the evidence contains something which might disclose military information. The policy has been to co-operate with the Press, as they have shown an inclination to co-operate with the Department.
