

MARKET REVIEW AND FORECAST

Toronto, Monday, Sept. 23.—The September bulletin issued by the United States Department of Agriculture, giving a general review of the crops and their prices, shows the composite condition of all crops at that date to be about 16.5 per cent better than on September 1st last year and 4.1 per cent better than the average on September 1st of recent years.

Prices on August 13 of 1912 and 1911, respectively, averaged, 19.12, 16.54 per 100 lbs.; beef cattle, 92.8, 84.36; veal calves, 46.62, 52.31; sheep, 84.26, 83.90; lambs, 46.62, 52.31; hogs, 84.26, 83.90; 142.26 each; horses, 114, 114; milk, 23.46, 23.36 per gallon; apples, 47c, 75c; peaches, 61c, 61.50; beans, 82.9, 82.90; sweet potatoes, 11.01, 11.07; onions, 81, 81.16; clover seed, 99.80, 99.60; timothy seed, 11c; peanuts, 18.46, 18.56, 15c per lb.; corn, 10.46, 10.46; cabbage, 92.96, 92.97 per 100 lbs.; broom corn, 85.4, 87.4; cottonseed, 116.0, 120.46; bran, 87.4, 85.26.

WHEAT

The wheat market is fairly strong, for, owing to bad weather in the north-west, the anticipated slump in prices has not taken effect.

Dealers quote as follows: No. 1 Northern, 81.13; No. 2, 81.10; 3, No. 3, 81.07; feed wheat, 65c, bush, Ontario wheat, No. 2, old, 70c; new wheat, 76c, bush, in lot fall wheat is selling at \$1 and loose wheat at 96c to 98c.

COARSE GRAINS

The bad weather has had a deteriorating effect on the oat crop, and prices are likely to rise sharply in consequence. Present local quotations are: No. 2 white Ontario oats, 46c to 48c at country points, 47c to 48c on track, Toronto; No. 3, 45c to 46c, bush, at country points, 46c and 46c, on track, Toronto. Canada No. 3, 45.12c, bush, at lake points; Western oats, No. 1, 47.13c at lake points; in car lots outside: American corn, yellow, No. 2, 85c; No. 3, 84c, bush, at lake points; buckwheat, 75c, bush, barley, No. 2, 66c; No. 3, 64c, bush, outside.

Montreal prices are as follows: American corn, No. 2, yellow, 86c to 88c; oats, C.W. No. 2, 53c; No. 1 feed, 50c; barley, new, matting, 70c to 75c; feed barley, 66c to 68c; bush, No. 2, 75c to 80c; bush; buckwheat, 74c to 75c, bush.

MILL STUFFS

The following quotations rule in mill stuffs: Manitoba bran, \$22 to \$23 a ton in bags, Toronto; shorts, \$23 to \$25 a ton in bags, Toronto; Ontario bran, \$22 to \$23 a ton; shorts, \$23 to \$25 a ton in bags, Toronto.

Montreal prices are firm and are as follows: Bran, \$21 to \$23; shorts, \$23.50 to \$26 a ton.

HIDES AND WOOL

Hide prices are firm and dealers quote No. 1 steers and cows, 12c, No. 2, 11c; No. 1, 11c to 11.5c; calves, 11c to 11.5c. Country prices range as follows: No. 1, 11c to 11.5c; green hides, 12c to 13c; horse skins, 17c to 18c; lamb skins, 5c; sheep skins, 17c to 18c; 15.12c to 15.12c a lb.; washed, 25c to 26c; rejects, 15c to 16c a lb.

HAY AND STRAW

The American hay crop will suffice amply for home purposes this year, and there is likely to be little or no export is every prospect of a brisk demand from the United Kingdom, and prices will likely be kept at a fair figure.

Local quotations are as follows: No. 1 hay, 81c to 81.50 a ton; No. 1 new, 81.50 to 81.50 a ton; No. 2, 79 to 81; No. 1, 88 to 88.50 a ton. No. 2 hay, 75c to 76c a ton. Timothy hay is selling at 81c to 81.50; clover and mixed hay, 81c to 81.50; straw in bundles, 11c to 11.5c a ton.

Montreal quotations are: No. 1, 81c to 81.50; No. 2, 81.50; clover and clover, mixed, 81c to 81.50 a ton.

EGGS AND POULTRY

Eggs are on the rise in price as they always are at this time. Fresh eggs are quoted by dealers at 25c to 26c a dozen; new laid eggs, 30c a dozen in case lots. On the 'Farmers' Market new laid eggs are selling at 26c to 28c a dozen. Montreal prices are as follows: New laid eggs, 25c to 30c; fresh eggs, 26c to 30c.
