NEW MARRIAGE
ACT ANNOUNCEDMarriage Will Be Made More
Difficult for Drunken
People and Idiots

TORONTO, April 4.—The Ontario Government's Marriage Act proposals were submitted to the Legislature yesterday and given first reading. The new clauses in the Act follow closely the lines indicated by Hon. W. J. Hanna in the House last week, and supply an effective means of putting a stop not only to the marriage of drunken and feeble-minded persons, but to runaway and bogus marriages generally.

The responsibility for preventing improper marriages is thrown jointly upon the issuer of marriage licenses and the clergyman who solemnizes the union. It is provided that if any person issues a license or any clergyman or other qualified person performs the marriage ceremony knowing either of the parties to be either an idiot or insane or under the influence of liquor, he shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding \$5,000, and also to a term of imprisonment not exceeding 12 months.

Another clause makes subject to similar punishment any person who having been deprived of the right to solemnize marriage, does so.

The section dealing with notice of marriage in the case of non-residents is very explicit. It declares that where neither party to the marriage has been a resident for at least 15 days of the city, county or district in which the marriage is to be solemnized the license may only be issued upon the production of an affidavit by one of the parties stating that notice of the intended marriage, stating the names, occupation and usual place

of abode of both parties has been published once a week for three weeks immediately preceding the application in some local newspapers. These notices must be produced with the affidavit.

A qualifying clause is inserted to provide that a license may be issued by means of an application to the Registrar-General, who, being satisfied that the reason for having the license solemnized in the place mentioned without complying with the requirements of the preceding section is not to evade due publicity or for any improper purpose, may in writing authorize the issue of the license or certificate.

Keep Kiddies
off the Streets

TORONTO, April 4.—Legislation to protect the homeless and neglected children of the province was proposed by the Provincial Secretary in the Legislature early in the afternoon, in a bill amending the Children's Act.

Foremost among the measures advocated is that of preventing the going about the streets of small girls with street pianos, and the selling of papers at late hours by young boys. A clause also provides for the introduction of a system resembling that of the curfew, which shall keep the youngsters off the streets after nine o'clock at night.

Fathers who neglect to support their children will be penalized, and a registration system of parents who put their children in refuge homes will be kept.

Arrangements are also made for the disposal of such children by the children's court, which shall place them as wards in homes.

Fathers who are financially capable may be forced by the court to support their children.

A CLEAVAGE
IN CABINETAsquith's Colleagues Shocked
Over Marconi Scandal

LONDON, April 4.—The Pall Mall Gazette, referring to the statement that there was a disagreement in the Cabinet, owing to the Marconi affair, confirms this report. It says that several members of the Ministry have received a disagreeable shock from the revelations of the deals of their colleagues and the anxiety as to the result of the enquiry is not concealed, but the rumors that Lloyd George and Sir Rufus Isaacs resign are not true.

The Parliamentary Committee has before them to-day the brokers who acted for Lloyd George and Sir Rufus Isaacs. That examination did not result in anything of great consequence. The questioners tried vainly to get the brokers to admit that the deals of these members of the Cabinet were speculations and not investments.

Mr. Booth, Liberal member of Parliament for Pontefract, a member of the committee, withdrew from the session because the chairman ruled against his enquiries in regard to the transactions in America Marconi shares by Lloyd George.
