OFFERED BURIAL IN WESTMINSTER

British Government Made the Suggestion to Lady Strathcona.

OTAWA, Jan. 23.—The proposal that the remains of Lord Strathcona be laid in Westminster Abbey, was communicated to Premier Borden yesterday by cable together with the decision which had been reached in regard to it. The High Commissioner, in accordance with his expressed wish, will be buried in the family vault at Highgate, the funeral taking place on Monday. The message received yesterday was as follows: "The Secretary of State on behalf of his Majesty's Government, with the approval of the Dean of Westminster, suggested to the family that take place in Westminster Abbey as mark of the public respect and esteem entertained for Lord Strathcona in every part of his Majesty's dominions. Lady Strathcona and family, recognizing and appreciating the very general desire that the service should be in Westminster Abbey have accepted, and it will be held in that place on Monday, 26th inst., at 11.30 a.m. With full approval of his colleagues, the Dean of Westminster offered the privilege of having Lord Strathcona's remains interred in the abbey, but his Lordship's desire to be buried in the family vault at Highgate had been so definitely expressed that this offer was most gratefully declined."

LIVED IN POVERTY AND LEFT \$203,963

Peterboro Man Assumed the Name of William Smith in New York.

KEENE, Jan. 23.—Dudley Jardine, uncle of Albert Dudley Jardine, of Peterboro, Ont., who died in New York city, and for years previous lived in the direst poverty, it is said, left an estate valued at \$203,963. It is stated that he lived at a lodging house in New York under the name of William Smith, and that after his death at the Gouverneur Hospital a trunk was broken open to establish his identity, when a bank-book, stock, receipts, etc., were found, also a will executed May 28, 1889. This provided for the distribution of the estate, among those who benefit being Albert Dudley Jardine of Peterboro, Ont., \$500, and Elal Jardine, Norwood, niece, \$125. The sum of \$11,270 each was bequeathed to the Prison Association, the Women's branch of the Mission and Tract Society, the Boards of Foreign Missions and of Home Missions of the Presbyterian Church, and the New York P. E. Society, it is said. A number of relatives receive bequests of various amounts.
