Divided Double Header 50-50 With Bisons, Hearne Beaten

GRAYS AND BEARS TIE Providence and Newark Equal in Struggle For Pennant Honors

Toronto, July 29.—The Leafs held their own with Buffalo in Saturday's double-header, for they shut the Bisons out in the first by 4 to 0, but dropped the second by 5 to 2.
