—Hon Arthur Meighen at Winnipeg Addressing 5,000 voters at the great Union-Victory meeting at Winnipeg. Hon. Arthur Meighen, said: "The government, on whose behalf this meeting is called, and whose elements the speakers represent, is the outcome of a great popular movement. That movement took its birth from the date when the need for selective military service first became manifest in Canada. If called for the 'summing up' of the old party antipathies and the joining of our forces against the common foe, and from the very beginning of that movement to its consummation it had its mainpring in the city of Winnipeg. What more fitting than that we should hold the first Union-Victory meeting here? Our purpose is to present the principles and to show forth the spirit that had brought us together, and to sound the appeal of the new government in this province. 'What we ought to do is to create in this hall something of the atmosphere of war—sense of the realities of this day and hour. What we have to do, whether we like it or not, is to walk over and stand on the edge of evil and take a look at what is going on. We are in the wild climax of a world-war-fighting, with suffering, struggling—and the fourth winter is upon us. We are in death grips with a cruel, savage Colossus. Terrible is the plight of Europe at this moment; but we believe the plight of Germany is far worse than ours; but whether beaten or worse it is now or never for the Entente, it is now or never for British democracy, it is now or never for Canada. To hold the faith of our allies, to be honest with ourselves, we have to fight to the last ounce of our strength. We have got to the stage of this struggle where every atom counts. 'Those who really want to win the war and don't get together and pull together don't know what the war is. We cannot fight our best fight divided. If there had not been union among the people, the spirit of union wherever there was the spirit of war, there never could have been an union at Ottawa. It was a consummation hard indeed to accomplish, hard on one side as on the other. The ties of old associates are strong. The subordination of political opinions even in matters of secondary consideration is a difficult task. Mr. Meighen then went into a detailed argument of the need for reinforcements at the front showing since the beginning of this year the net loss to the Canadian Expeditionary Force had been 50,027. Mr. Meighen then expounded Sir Robert Borden's proposal for immediate action to meet the situation. He proceeded to discuss what he described as Sir Wilfrid Laurier's policy of delay as propounded in his letter to the Win-the-War League at Hamilton. 'This country must carefully guard against that delay and see that the men returned to the House of Commons are whole-hearted in their determination to prosecute this struggle to a victorious end. Every vote cast for a Laurier candidate will be a vote to delay that assistance,' said Mr. Meighen. 'No man or woman is asked to reverse or abrogate conviction on fiscal or other subjects. The accepted basis of union was the only basis on which union was possible under present conditions, and our appeal is that the people of Canada unite on the same basis on which the members of the government have united and get behind this union and stay behind it until it achieves its end. 'There will be political sacrifice to be made one way or the other in every constituency. We must on a fair principle, adopt the best candidate in every county, swing as in one body behind him, and never rest till he is elected.' Mr. Meighen made an earnest call to the women of Manitoba; 'General women's enfranchisement is promised af-
