THE COAL COMMISSION

(Edmonton Bulletin)

The appointment of the coal commission by the Alberta government is the fulfillment of a promise made by the minister of public works last February in the legislature, when the west was in the grip of a coal famine. At that time a most serious state of affairs prevailed in the southern part of this province, in the neighboring province of Saskatchewan and in Manitoba. At that time there was legislation before the house, introduced by a private member, to establish an eight hour law in the province. The legislature as well as the minister of public works were of the opinion that any legislation undertaken in this regard must be framed with an intelligent conception of the relative interests of the miners, the operators and the public. The interests of these three parties will form the subject of the commission's enquiry and upon the report it is the intention of the government to affect by legislative enactment, as far as is possible to do so without becoming too paternal or tyrannous, some machinery that will provide for the continuous operation of the mines, and prevent a recurrence of the suffering through fuel destitution as prevailed last winter. Coal mining in Alberta is a comparatively new industry and one that has such an essential relation to progress and development in the economy of the community, that anything that will bring into operation a system enabling the disputants to settle their differences without the painful method of industrial war will be hailed with joy by all classes.

IGNORANT PATRIOTISM An incident which is likely to arouse the suspicions of an international difficulty, occurred in Winnipeg when the American flag was torn down from the United States Consulate on Notre Dame avenue by two Englishmen. Dr. Jones of Hong Kong, has just assumed the duties of consul and in deference to the Victoria day celebration had the Union Jack run up on the consulate under the American flag. This is the first occasion since the time of Consul Taylor that the Union Jack has been flown from the consulate. Some ignorant individuals seeing the Union Jack upon the American flag, evidently considered it an insult and climbing up on the roof tore down the American flag. Consul Jones was away at the time and the house was unoccupied. The consul when interviewed said that he regretted the incident very much, but he said that he knew the sentiment expressed in tearing down the Stars and Stripes did not represent the feelings of the citizens of Winnipeg towards the Republic.

BETTER THAN NEBRASKA Davidson Farmer Reviews his Experience, and Says Canadian West is all Right Davidson, May 25.—J. Lenzen, 36-24-2, an old experienced farmer, who has watched the records on wheat raising for over half a century, has the following to say about wheat raising in the Canadian Northwest: "As early as 1850 I started in on Illinois soil where I raised wheat to perfection, both fall and spring, for twenty years, but after 1862 we had so quit and give it up for a bad job. Then Iowa got in the lead, and later the Red River country, and where are they today? All bad results and now a thing of the past so far as wheat raising is concerned. "For the last ten years Kansas, Oklahoma and Nebraska, thought wheat was the crop; and where are they today? They will find out in the future that they will also have to give it up also. Here in Saskatchewan it is different. The climate is specially adapted to wheat raising even if we have cold severe winter, and late spring, sometimes, which make it a little discouraging, and the men who stay at it will be winners. There are drawbacks in every country and far worse than that, and was in Nebraska, and did not raise a white bean for four years in succession, and still the land went up from four dollars to one hundred dollars per acre, and you can raise more on one acre in the Canadian west than on two acres in Nebraska, and the land averages about fifteen dollars
