



The lower rating would follow the ad-option of the "loss-off system" by which the buyer would be idemnified against the sale of tainted eggs. The egg trade is becoming collosal and it has been attended by such disasters on goods that an agreement was decided upon. This agreement involved the utmost care in the selection and marketing of eggs, guaranteed the buyer against imposition, and secured Field him against losses of any kind. It was charged at the meeting of the Produce Association that the agreement had been violated or ignored, and it was decided to be more persistent in its enforcement. During this year the Agricultural Department at Ottawa issued bulletin with regard to eggs. One bulletin explained why so many are rotten, and gives such direction that farmer and purchaser who read it should be greatly benefited. The Produce Associa-tion will petition the federal government to be more aggressive and formal in its educational campaigns, and there is sound reason in this. 
