I allude to the wells from which the drinking water for the farmer's family. drinking water for the farmer's famiand animals is obtained. Call at farm house in the summer for a drink of water, and in many cases you will notice something wrong. Now uncover the well and what you will see will quench your thirst very quick—a toad or rat, or perhaps a snake, bloated up and floating on top of the water in the last stages of decomposition. Pump out the water and you will find a pail full of skeletons of former vica pail full of skeletons of former vic-tims, as well a sa collection of bugs, worms, et cetera, that would turn the stomach of a hog. I do not say that tims, as well as through the country are in that condition, but many of them are, and this water is used for drinking by the farmer's family, as well as for washing all milk vessels and the butter made under such con-ditions is carried to market and pro-nounced lovely.
