CARRIED HERO TO COCKPIT.

Grandson Lives In Toronto — Grandfather Veteran of Trafalgar.

Toronto counts among her citizens the grandson of one of the men who fought with Nelson, and carried that wounded hero to the cockpit of the Victory, while the old ship flew the signal "England expects that every man this day will do his duty."

Mr. W. J. Kemish, an old navy man and a pensioner, living at 248 Brook avenue took a keen interest in the celebrations made on Trafalgar Day. In memory of that great sea battle, fought just one hundred years ago, on the 21st of this month.

Mr. Kemish's grandfather, whose name was Thomas Hastings, during his lifetime took part in some stirring and historical sea fights. At the battle of Trafalgar First-class Petty Officer Hastings was one of the crew of the ship "Hastings," Capt. Blackwood. During the battle Hastings, who was one of the crew of the captain's gig, helped row that officer aboard the "Victory," and after Nelson had been shot down assisted to carry him to the cockpit.

A few years later Mr. Hastings, having risen to the rank of a warrant officer, was aboard the "Hastings" during that memorable fight with the Chesapeake.

When the odds were going against the British ship, Capt. Brooke shouted to his men, "Board my brave fellows; we shall yet win the day." Hastings was one of the boarding party, and during the rush he had his right wrist cut in two by a blow from a cutlass.

Later Mr. Hastings was appointed boatswain of the Pembroke dockyard, in Wales, and received William IV. during his visit there.

Mr. Kemish followed in the footsteps of his father and grandfather, and at the age of 14 was an ordinary seaman on the paddle-wheel sloop Alecia, five guns, stationed on the west coast of Africa. During his tour of duty he saw a lot of fighting. He assisted in the capture of six slave ships, out of the Congo, and the prize money amounted to \$20,000. While on the African coast Mr. Kemish was sent in charge of a prize crew to take the captured American brigantine Woodward, with 612 slaves in her hold, to St. Helena. During the trip 188 of the slaves died.

Upon returning from the African station Mr. Kemish was appointed to Algiers, 51 guns, attached to the Mediterranean fleet. After having spent four years on that station he was appointed to the gunnery ship Excellent at Portsmouth, and went through a first-class course in gunnery, and appointed to the corvette Fawn. Mr. Kemish was in 1864 to 1865 on the North American station. The Fawn was at Jamaica during the negro rebellion, and assisted in putting it down. Mr. Kemish remembers seeing eighteen blacks hanged one morning before breakfast. The same vessel was also stationed at St. Andrew, N. B., during the Fenian raid, and captured two boats, loaded with rifles. Mr. Kemish has amongst his medals that given for the Fenian raid. Mr. Kemish was then appointed to the Endymion, and made a trip round the world in her under Sir John Ormsby.

Returning to England, Mr. Kemish went through yet another gunnery course, and was then appointed chief gunner's mate on the H. M. S. Vulture, doing duty as a commission officer. Whilst in the Vulture lying at Zanzibar the body of the famous explorer, Dr. Livingstone, was brought down to the coast, and taken aboard the Vulture, and the Vulture was to take him to his grave. Mr. Kemish received his pension and left the service. He is also in receipt of a Greenwich Hospital pension. Mr. Kemish came to Canada in 1879, and settled in Toronto.

Lord Nelson and Canada.

Mr. Henry J. Morgan, author of Men and Women of Canada, writes The Globe from Ottawa: In a recent issue of your paper you recall an incident in the life of Nelson where the hero, not long before the battle of Trafalgar, visited the premises of Messrs. Pettit & Son, undertakers, Brewer street, Golden Square, to take a view of his coffin. You rightly state that the coffin in question was a gift to his chief from Capt. Benjamin Halliwell, who had this gruesome token of affection made from a piece of the main mast of the French frigate L'Orion, captured at the battle of the Nile, "in order that Nelson might be buried in one of his own trophies," but what perhaps is not generally known, to our people in connection with this occurrence is that Capt. Halliwell was the son of a Canadian gentleman—a Unitarian. Lord Nelson, who, after an exciting, and eventful career, died at York, now Toronto, where he was a landed proprietor, March 28th, 1799. Mr. Halliwell, Sr., according to Sabine, was the father of another eminent Canadian, Chief Justice Elmsley, at whose house he died, and by whom his remains were interred in the old Garrison burial ground at York. Mr. Halliwell, Sr., was a Unitarian, and it is presumed that the Township of Halliwell, in the County of Prince Edward, was named after him. Although his distinguished son, Capt. afterwards Admiral, Halliwell, is stated by no less an authority than the Dictionary of National Biography to have been born in Canada, I am otherwise led to believe that his place of birth was Boston, Massachusetts, where his father, previous to the American revolution, held office as Commissioner of Customs, with a seat in the Royal Council. The son lived, as I have said, to become an Admiral, and besides receiving the Neapolitan Order of St. Ferdinand, was decorated by his Sovereign with the Grand Cross of the Order of the Bath. Having in his later years, succeeded to the estates of the Carews of Beddington, he assumed the name and arms of that family. He was a worthy and gallant officer, whose meritorious services in every sea entitled him to a conspicuous place in the naval annals of his country.

MRS. HUBBARD A CANADIAN.

First Woman to Explore Labrador Wilds Born in Ontario.

In the Township of Hamilton, Northumberland, Ont., was born Mrs. Leonard Hubbard, the celebrated woman who is the first Canadian lady to explore the wilds of Labrador. The announcement that the much-heralded New York explorer is a Canadian will cause surprise, but it is authentic. According to Dr. Morgan, author of Canadian Men and Women of the Time, Mrs. Hubbard, just returned from her adventurous journey to discover the secrets of her late husband's failure and subsequent death in that black and inhospitable country, is one of our own countrywomen.

She is the daughter of James Bennett, a farmer of Bewdley, Township of Hamilton, County of Northumberland, Ontario. As a girl she qualified as a trained nurse, and while in the performance of her duties as such took up her residence in New York, where she was called upon to nurse Dr. Leonard Hubbard, Jr., through a serious illness.

It was a case on his part of love at first sight, and a marriage soon followed. The world knows how in 1893 her husband met his death in the Labrador wilds, and it was to clear up doubts and uncertainties, and also to complete the report of her husband's exploration, that she undertook the journey from which she has now returned.

When her husband returned to Quebec, she was found to be a small, slight woman, of delicate and refined appearance, who would seem to be the last to face the dangers and hardships of such a journey through the wilderness. She politely but firmly declined to be questioned about her expedition. She would merely say that she had followed the route taken by her husband from the coast to the point where he had met his death from exposure and starvation, that she had found where he had diverged from his route and lost his way, that she had cleared up some important points in regard to the head waters of the Northwest River, which flows into Lake Melville and Hamilton Inlet, as well as in regard to Lake Mishikamun, the height of land, and the George River, which flows into Ungava Bay, and that she had not suffered much from the hardships of the journey.

Mrs. Hubbard emphatically denied that she went to Labrador to locate mineral wealth said to have been discovered by Mr. Hubbard on his fatal trip. She simply set out to complete the work which he began, and has succeeded in doing so.

MARK HANNA ROCK GONE.

Stood on the Pacific Coast and Was Gravestone For Ships.

A recent despatch from Victoria, B. C., says: Notification has been sent by Lighthousekeeper Daykin of Cape Carmichael to the resident agent of the Department of Marine, that "Mark Hanna" Rock, otherwise known to navigators of the North Pacific as one of the many mariners' gravestones that decorate the western seaboard of Vancouver Island, has strangely disappeared.

The rock until very recently reared 50 feet above the water, near Bonilla Point, off Carmichael, the Canadian sentinel at the entrance of the Straits of San Juan de Fuca, opposite Cape Flattery, on the American shore.

The rock was named for the Ohio statesman and Republican organizer by Lighthousekeeper Daykin, because of the remarkable likeness its contour bore to a facial silhouette of the late American Senator. Apart from this distinguishing feature, however, there was another peculiarity about Mark Hanna Rock which in earlier time might have invested it with superstitious dread. It is said that it possessed a remarkable magnetic power, for on its rugged and storm-beaten base many a vessel has pounded to destruction.

But the rock is no more. It was destroyed some weeks ago in the seismic and electrical disturbance felt in slight degree here and to a greater extent at Nanaimo. It was noticed, black and grim, rearing itself through the storm in the afternoon preceding the quake. In the morning Lighthousekeeper Daykin observed with amazement that the sea broke untroubled there it had lifted itself from the deep.

The question is now being debated among local scientists whether or not the strange magnetic force said to be a property of the rock had ought to do with its final demolition.

Adopting Ontario Methods.

The Provincial Department of Agriculture has received an interesting note from Leonard, Mr. George Bain, editor of the Nainshire Telegraph, called at the Department last year, and among the publications given him were some of the Nature Study bulletins issued by the Department for Public School teachers. Mr. Bain states that some of the teachers of the Nain district are very much interested in these, and intend to use them as the basis of their nature study work. The steady demand for these bulletins from Ontario Public School teachers has exhausted the bulletins on "Weeds," "Grasses" and "The Making of Collections." The bulletin on "Weeds" has been revised by Prof. Orinhead, making it more suitable for teachers, and it will be re-issued during the winter.

Flight of Birds.

Pigeons fly at the rate of fifty-five miles an hour, swallows at the rate of ninety-two, rooks at the rate of twenty-five. There was once a three-mile race held up for a wager between a dozen birds and a dozen pigeons. The first bird finished a quarter of a minute before the first pigeon, and the birds won all round, although they were hard-disputed somewhat by being previously filled in flour for the purpose of identification.

How Canada Was Saved.

In reviewing Capt. Mahan's book "The Power in its relations to the war of 1812" The London Post says: "We doubt whether his narrative brings out as fully as the facts justify that it was the patriotism and gallantry of the Canadian militia which saved Canada during that uphill game of the first twelve months."
