FUNERAL OF MAJOR WALSH. Brockville's Civil and Military Bodies

Brockville's Civil and Military Bodies Pay Last Respects.

Brockville, July 29.—The military funeral of the late Major Walsh yesterday afternoon was a most impressive spectacle, augmented as it was by an immense number of visitors from a distance and local sympathizers. The whole town turned out en masse to pay tribute to the memory of the dead soldier, and during the passing of the cortege through the main street to the cemetery business places were closed and flags flew at half-mast. The streets were crowded with people.

The 41st Regiment, Brockville Riffes, under command of Major Fisher, furnished the firing party, about

In the cortege were representatives of the local civic bodies, South African and Fenian Raid veterans, the 4th Hussars, the 56th Regiment, Lisgar Rifies, and the Ganano-que Field Battery. Col. Gordon, commander of the eastern district, and staff were also present.

The body of Major Walsh, with the casket draped in a Union Jack, was borne on a gun carriage procurred from B Battery, Kingsion, and to the music of "The Dead March," the 41st Regiment Band led the procession.

Rev. Norman MacLeod, Minister of the First Church, conducted the simple burial service of the Presbyterian Church, both at the house and grave, assisted by Rev. R. Strachan, chaplain of the 41st Regiment. The firing party discharged three rounds over the grave and the bugle sounded "The Last Call."

Pilot Mound, July 20. - Rev. Dr. Carquharson preached his farewell sermons in the Presbyterian Church here last Sunday, July 16th. The church was crowded to the doors both
