Sweden Concludes Arrangement With Banking Syndicate.

Stockholm, July 29.—In pursuance of the authorization of Parliament, the Government has concluded an arrangement with the Swedish National Bank and a syndicate of foreign banks represented by the Commercial Bank of Stockholm for a loan of \$25,000,000. The whole amount is to be placed at the Government's disposal within a year from August 1.

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Investigating Child's Death.

Shelburne, July 29.—The interest in this Melancthon Township over the death of Sarah Adeline Scace, the two-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Scace, of lot 15, con. 6, continues. The Scaces are members of the sect commonly known as "Evening Lights," although the members of the persuasion prefer the name "Church of God" and call themselves Saints. The little one died Thursday night, July 20. Dr. Martin of Dundalk had been called in Thursday night, but would not examine the child, as Scace would not promise to administer remedies. The belief of the neighborhood was that the child had pneumonia or diphtheria. After death, Dr. Martin went to the house and performed a post mortem. Dr. A. T. Steele of Shelburne, corner, decided that an inquest was necessary, and it was proceeded with in the Town Hall yesterday. County Crown Attorney McKay of Orangeville was present. The proceedings were adjourned till the hour of 4 o'clock on Friday, August 11, as Mr. and Mrs. Scace are both yet in their house under quarantine.

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St. Catharines, July 29.—Of late Eugene Winninger, chef at the Russell House, has been very intimate with Jennie Pollock, the head waitress, so says the wife of Mr. Winninger, he being a married man with two children. Proprietor Quinn learning of the trouble discharged the waitress. On Thursday afternoon Pete King, another employee, gave out the information that the "sheriff has gone with Jennie." The two left for the Falls on the 5 o'clock trolley. Winninger left without getting his wages, amounting to \$50, which were due him. He has erected a house on William street lately, and it is thought that he borrowed a large sum on this.

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TO RAISE HUGE LOAN.

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PIONEER MINISTER

Dr. Farquharson, Brother of D. R. Farquharson, Leaves Pilot Mound for Winnipeg After 25 Years Pioneer Service

Pilot Mound, July 20. — Rev. Dr. Farquharson preached his farewell sermons in the Presbyterian Church here last Sunday, July 16th. The church was crowded to the doors both morning and evening, many people being present from distant points of the country.

On Monday evening a farewell social was held at the church, which was attended by all members of the congregation in the Pilot Mound district, and by almost all from the out-lying districts.

A joint address to Dr. and Mrs. Farquharson was read on behalf of the congregation by Mr. J. M. Fraser. Mrs. Farquharson was presented with a very valuable tray and cut glass bowl, and Dr. Farquharson with a cheque for nearly \$340.

During the previous week, the Floral portion of the congregation had presented Dr. and Mrs. Farquharson with two handsome chairs and both Floral and Woodday districts had presented him with well filled purses.

Dr. Farquharson goes to Winnipeg at the call of the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Western Canada, especially in connection with home mission business. Universal regret is felt and is generally expressed at his departure from Pilot Mound, but all feel that in leaving he was doing just what he considered to be his duty.

Dr. Farquharson came to Pilot Mound just as a student in the summer of 1880 holding services as frequently as possible here and there over the wide stretch of prairie between Killarney and Manitou, and taking in a good part of Southern Manitoba and Northern Dakota. In the winter of 1881-82 he returned at the call of the Pilot Mound people, was ordained and inducted minister of the congregation, and has been here continuously ever since. His ministry of nearly twenty-four years, just closed, is said to be without an equal in length in any congregation in the west, with the exception of the ministry of Rev. Dr. Black, of Kildonan.
