LOTS OF RAIN.

Half an Inch in Two Days Helps Crops—Humidity Wilts the People.

Exactly half an inch of rain was recorded at the Dominion Meteorological Station at the University of New Brunswick as the result of Sunday's and yesterday's rainstorms which were accompanied by electrical disturbances. The heaviest rainfall was recorded following last night's storm when four-tenths of an inch of rain fell. Sunday's storm only produced one-tenth of an inch of rain. Sunday's and Monday's storms brought the rainfall record for the month over 2.1 inches. The heavy rainfall last evening brought relief from the humidity caused by an oppressive rise in temperature. The maximum temperature recorded yesterday was 79.5 degrees at the University, a mark which was surpassed by city records. The rains have given the crops a great impetus. Incidentally the weather conditions have completely tied up the operations of the Royal Canadian Air Force crew of the flying-boat which arrived here last Friday to make an aerial photographic survey of the city.
