## General Intelligence

At Ottawa.

OTTAWA, May 23rd, 1897. The Session draws to a close. Some say that it will end next week. Some believe that it will close this week. Some look forward to a month of legislation. It would be safest to strike an average and say two weeks. Not more than half the main estimates are yet passed. There are \$1,400,000 worth of supplementary estimates for the current year which have not yet been touched. The supplementary estimates for the year which is to commence in July have not even been brought down. No less than twelve Government bills have not reached the second reading which is the stage where the discussion usually begins. Several others are a little farther along, but not through committee. Another batch are only introduced, and at last day's sitting Sir Richard, then leading the house, announced that the Government was not in a position to say how many or what new measures were yet to be brought forward. So we may safely count on two more weeks at least on three or four more if the Government snatches out another Yukon deal.

THE FRANCHISE BILL.

The Franchise bill has gone to the Senate after a long and painful sojourn in the House of Commons. It has undergone much cutting and slashing which has been greatly to its advantage in the opinion of the conservative critics. The country is to have after all a printed electoral list issued from Ottawa. The provincial control is not absolute, but is limited by many amendments. One amendment, however, was rejected, on the request of the Premier. Sir Charles Tupper asked that the bill be sent back to the committee with instruction to provide for an appeal to a judge from the final revision in provinces where such an appeal was not provided by local law. Ontario and Quebec have, in some cases at least, provided such an appeal. In Nova Scotia and Manitoba there is not such guarantee of fair play and the conservatives believe that they are not fairly treated. Mr. Fielding and Mr. Sifton deny that there is ground for the complaint, but Mr. Ball, Mr. Mills, Mr. Gillis, Mr. Kuitbach, of Nova Scotia, and Mr. Livierville and Dr. Roche, of Manitoba, produce strong evidence to the contrary. Sir Wilfrid admitted that a request for a judicial revision was reasonable. He said it was provided by law in his province, and he believed that the Nova Scotia and Manitoba legislatures would see their way clear to do the right thing. Whether they do or not he would request the House not to interfere.

POSTAGE.

Hon. Mr. Mulock has got his postage bill for the third reading. The opposition gave him one bad night's rest on account of his refusal to answer reasonable questions. He remained obstinate from early in the afternoon until nearly midnight.

Having made no progress at all he concluded to tell how he came to issue his famous imperial postage proclamation which he was obliged to recall a few weeks later. After he became civil and communicative he got along better but not well enough to escape the committee until a later day. The bill has been repeatedly amended. As it now stands the postage will be paid by the Government. No paper issued after that date will be exempted. The newspaper postage begins next January. The part of the bill which provides for the reduction of letter postage to two cents which does not go into effect until the 1st of January next. Mr. Mulock suggested that the reduction will be equal to the postal revenue is equal to the expenditure. This may occur in three or four years, but is more likely not to happen for ten years.

HOW WE PAY.

The first batch of supplementary estimates provides what is needed to carry the Government through the year that ends next month. The main vote and one supplementary were taken last session. This sum includes a present of \$5,000 to Government surveyor Ogilvie who has spent some years in the country and has rendered great service there. Mr. Ogilvie has prepared a valuable Yukon book which sells easily for fifty cents. He would have made several times five thousand dollars out of that work, but as a government officer, he was not allowed to publish and sell it. The Government gave to a Toronto firm, without competition, the right to publish the book on such terms that the publisher is making a small fortune out of the job. Mr. Ogilvie, whose brain and labor earned the money, gets his gratuity out of the treasury. Another Yukon item is \$100,000 for transport and supplies for the militia force sent there last month. There is \$14,000 for the examination of the Stickeen, and \$5,000 for exploring a railway route to the Yukon. Outside the Yukon vote, perhaps, the most important new charge is one for investigating the affairs of the St. Vincent Penitentiary near Montreal. The
