NOW IN DURANCE

Four Men Believed to Be Implicated in Robberies Along I. C. R.

NOW IN RIMOUSKI JAIL

Rimouski, Que., Nov. 8.—Four men believed to be concerned in the robbery of Ote's store in St. Octave, Que., on Tuesday last, the blowing open of the safe in the Intercolonial Railway office at Campbellton, N. B., on Wednesday night, and the robbery of shanties along the line of the Intercolonial, have been arrested and sentenced to the Rimouski jail for one month for vagrancy. Two of the men were captured by Inspector Noble, of the Intercolonial police, in an empty box car on a freight train near St. Moise, on Friday night. They gave their names as John Murphy and Thomas Wilson. The charges of safe-blowing will be laid against these men, who the police say are experts at the business.

BIG MYSTERY SOLVED NOW

St. John Man Gets a Letter Regarding Creamer Children.

NOW IN BOSTON

They Left Westmorland in a Vessel Bound For New York.

St. John, Nov. 7.—It is claimed that the three-and-a-half-year-old mystery of the vanished Creamer children has been solved for the people of this province by the receipt of a letter sent from Boston to Superintendent McDonald of the Industrial Home for Boys, Crouville. The letter, if authentic, and Mr. McDonald is fully convinced of the truth of its statements, removes all the suspicions of a murder in various forms which haunted the province for many months, and stamped the disappearance as one of the most awesome of which New Brunswick has ever been the scene.

Mr. McDonald's letter states that the children are now in Boston, alive and well. They have not been in that city since their disappearance, however, but were taken first to New York.

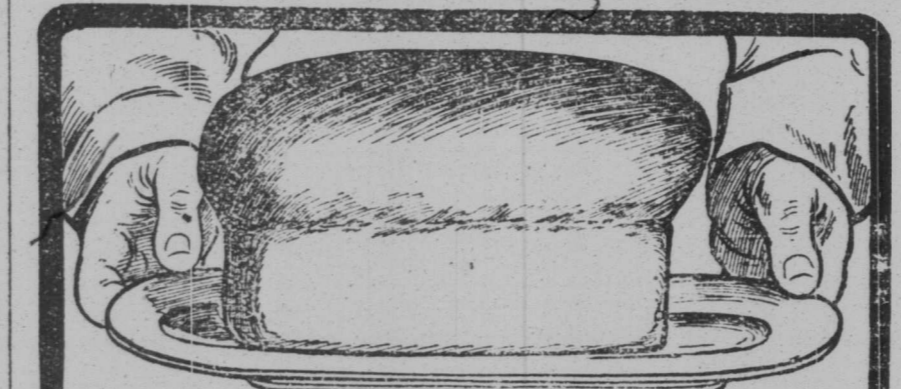
TAKEN ABOARD VESSEL

The communication states that Creamer children were taken aboard a vessel at Sackville, where the N. B. and P. E. Island railway ends after serving the country in which the children lived and disappeared. They were received, it is said, by a captain who was a friend of their father, and were taken direct to New York.

Armed Quebec Posse Is On the Trail of Human Fiends.

Montreal, Nov. 6.—Six hundred men fully armed and determined to shoot on sight are scouring the county near Stanstead, P. Q., for two men who criminally assaulted the seven-year-old daughter of A. H. Giffin, the local Post Master.

Bertha Giffin left her home, which is on the outskirts, to go to the post office. When passing a vacant field near the woods which skirt the town she was grabbed by two men with guns who forced her to the bush and there both assaulted her. She crawled to the sidewalk and was found by the townspeople and taken home, where she is in a very critical condition.

GIRL IS ACCUSED OF POISONING

Mrs. Cook Had a Case Call.

Fredericton, Nov. 5.—According to reports which have been made by the authorities Mrs. Harvey Cook, of St. Mary's, had a narrow escape from poisoning this week and suspicion has rested upon a young girl as being responsible for administering the poison. The girl in question is about 16 or 17 years old. It appears that a day or two ago Mrs. Cook was suddenly seized with symptoms like poisoning. A physician was summoned and for some time the condition of the woman was serious.

In the meantime a detective was engaged on the case of Mr. Cook. It is thought that the poison administered to Mrs. Cook was arsenic, of which there was a considerable quantity in the house for use as a medicine for a sick horse.

The family physician, when asked about the case this afternoon, stated that Mrs. Cook was now recovering, but it would be impossible for him to say what kind of poisoning she had suffered from, although he was led to believe it was arsenic. It is unlikely that any action will be taken against the suspect.
