CANADIAN TRADE REPORT.

We thank Mr. Ray, Canadian Trade Commissioner, for copies of several monthly reports of the Department of Trade and Commerce of Canada. We have before us the return for December, 1909.

The first part of this report is taken up with General Information as to foodstuffs imported into the United Kingdom. In wheat Canada is in the front rank with Russia, United States, the British East Indies and the Argentine Republic, the latter with an easy lead. In wheat meal, the United States leads with Canada a bad second, less than a third of its rivals trade. In cheese Canada leads, its rivals are away out of sight. In bacon Denmark divides the imports with the United States. In butter Denmark leads and the rest are nowhere. In eggs Russia leads and Denmark comes second with two-thirds of the trade between them.

Denmark is the great object lesson of the world for its predominance in butter, and the marked advance in the bacon and egg markets.

A generation ago Denmark was a bankrupt farming country. New methods based on co-operation and scientific training have revolutionized agriculture there. Agricultural Colleges, village farming schools, scientific farming teaching and co-operative effort have won success.

Rule of thumb farming made the country bankrupt, model dairy farming and scientific agricultural training have made it the most successful dairy country in the world, and easily first at that.

The total imports of the Dominion for 1909 amounted to \$309,756,698, while the total exports were \$261,512,159.

This is a marked advance over any other year but 1908, which was the banner commercial year of Canada. Her exports last year of minerals exceeded 37 million dollars, of fish, 13 millions, of forest products, 39 millions, of animal products, 52 millions, of agricultural products, 82 millions, of manufactures, nearly 40 millions.

She exported 692,963 quintals of Dry Codfish, valued at \$3,295,341; 9,298,467 lbs. of Canned Lobster, valued at \$2,755,034; 18,121,401 lbs. of Canned Salmon, valued at \$2,468,479.

Her trade with Newfoundland for the last four years has been stationary, amounting to about \$5,100,000, two-thirds of its being exports to Newfoundland, and one-third imports from

Newfoundland. In 1909 Newfoundland took from her slightly more than the year before, and sold her somewhat less, the values being \$3,552,293 and \$1,638,423, respectively.

The following items are amongst those which are specially noted in the unreviewed statement for the last nine months of 1909.

Imports into Canada from Newfoundland: \$559,780 worth of iron ore; \$65,670 worth of fish oil. Exports from Canada to Newfoundland for last nine months of last year:—Horned cattle, \$102,300; wheat flour, \$1,492,268; clothing and wearing apparel, \$24,553; coal, \$400,857; cordage, rope and twine, \$2,253; gunpowder, explosives, \$60,774; leather, \$52,830; boots and shoes, \$13,552; hardware, \$9,484; steel, \$64,803; paper, \$15,043; butter, \$43,660; cheese, \$34,283; beef (home), \$9,417; foreign, \$13,432; salt (home), \$1,945; foreign, \$10,919; tea (foreign), \$16,920; furniture, \$14,003; wool manufactures, \$23,570.

Attempted Suicide.

The doctor thinks that with good care and treatment of the wound that the patient will live. Geary is about 56 years of age and is a life-long resident of Carbonear.

Job's Bankers Arrives.

Job Bros. & Co. had a message this morning from Lark Harbor saying that their banking schooner the Hispanola had arrived there with 450 qts. fish from the Banks. The vessel, commanded by Capt. Jno. Lewis, left Hr. Breton on the 27th March and was only 25 days out, and did well on her first baiting. Their banker the Exceida, Capt. John F. Lewis, arrived at Harbor Breton yesterday morning with 270 qts. on the first baiting. Both vessels have done well for a starter.

Winsor Lake Property.

Yesterday Mayor Gibbs with Sec. J. L. Slattery, of the Municipal Council, went out to Winsor Lake and looked over the properties there with a view to appropriating them for the protection of the waters of the lake against pollution. About 12 houses will be removed from the north side of the lake, and the people owning them will be compensated for the land which may be taken from them.

Boots Missing.

Saturday night several women entered a Water Street store, when after the clerk had handed down several boxes of boots, two of them bought a pair each, and another asked for several things which were not in stock. After they had departed the clerk noticed that a pair of boots valued at \$3 were missing.

Will Get New Spars.

The little schr. Ripple, from Mussel Harbor, P.B., which had both her topmasts carried away at 11 p.m. Saturday in a snow squall, arrived here this morning. The accident occurred off Cape Pine, and 9 feet of the mainmast and 11 feet of the foremast were carried away and with the top rigging came by the board. The vessel was towed from Trepassy by the Virginia Dare, but met another snowstorm off Cape Spear Monday evening and had to run for shelter to Bay Bulls.

ICEBERGS OFF NARROWS.—Two small icebergs were seen off the Narrows to-day—the first for the season. The fishermen using traps will be glad to hear that there are very few this side of Belle Isle, in the Straits, this spring.

SOCIABLE.—The Ladies Guild held a sociable, last night at Wesley Church rooms. The pastor, Rev. J. K. Curtis, delivered the opening address. The entertainment consisted of recitations, club swinging, and singing.
