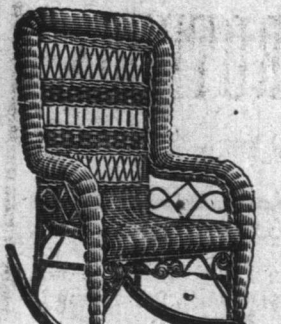

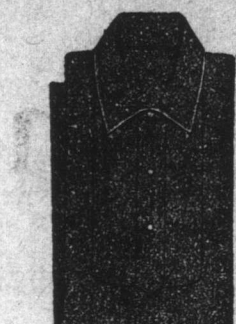

Chinese Loan.

Special Evening Telegram. TOKIO, To-Day. The Chinese loan of £30,000,000 is to be made up by a group of English, American, French and German bankers. China pledges the Manchurian Customs and also gives the lenders preference in future loans. The move is regarded here as a means of keeping Japan and Russia out of Manchuria and is the subject of bitter newspaper discussion and diplomatic correspondence. The Nichi Nichi says positively that Japan is employing her friendship with England and France to get these Governments to modify the attitude of the States and Germany and have them induce their financiers who are in the four power group to change the article referred to.

British Detectives

Asked to Arrest Los Angeles Dynamiters. London, July 1. - At the request of the American State Department, the Magistrates of Bow Street Court today issued provisional warrants for the arrest of David H. Kaplan and Milton A. Schmidt. The warrants were placed immediately in the hands of the Scotland Yard officials. The latter insist there is no evidence that the parties wanted in connection with the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building are here, beyond the belief of the Californian authorities that they came this way. The British police received the usual printed circular giving descriptions of the men, and saying that they were supposed to be in England. Immediately following the issuance of the warrants, detectives in all parts of the Kingdom were instructed to keep a sharp look-out for the fugitives.

Moral Reform.

Discourse Preached at the Adventist Church Last Night. At the Adventist Church last night Elder C. H. Keslake preached upon moral reform, taking for his text 2 Tim. 4: 3, 4. Referring to the present day moral reform movements Elder Keslake said that it cannot be denied that corruption prevails on every hand. But it was so in Christ's day. In seeking for the remedy for these conditions we must study the methods of Jesus. It has been asserted by some of the modern leaders in moral reform that God's ministers are appointed to administer in civil as well as religious things. And though not thus expressed by others yet this idea obtains in all. But this is wrong. Jesus was the greatest moral reformer the world has ever seen; yet he never sought to remedy the evils by appealing to the civil powers; nor did he attack them, or try to overthrow them. All Christ's reform work was in view of a kingdom other than the world's kingdoms. He said "My kingdom is not of this world." Christ was a Sabbath reformer. There was also a moral reform party in his day which sought to effect a reform in Sabbath observance. Christ and they were antagonistic in their ideas regarding this matter. Did Jesus appeal to the civil power to have his idea of Sabbath observance enforced? Never. But the others did. They plotted to kill Christ because he did not conform to their ideas, and eventually appealed to, and secured the co-operation of the civil power in putting him to death, and He was crucified as a Sabbath breaker. One argument they advanced was that unless this so-called Sabbath breaker was destroyed the nation would perish. But though they killed him the nation did not perish. Why? Because their methods were wrong. Referring to the question of personal liberty the Elder said that Jesus never invaded that, but, in opposition to the moral reformers of his day, steadfastly asserted his own. True reform will never destroy one's individuality nor rob him of his personal liberty.

Hickey hauled 140 qts. in trap at St. Mary's, Saturday. He also bagged five punt loads and lost it on landing owing to a heavy sea that set in at Wild Cove. D. St. Croix, had 140 last Thursday and up to same date D. Hicks had 200 qts. F. Lundrigan, Peter's River, 150, John Lineham, John's Pond, 150, Joseph Singleton, Salmonier, 160, Ambrose Daley, 200 for two dorics and J. St. Croix at Point La Have, 150 qts. This news was brought by Skipper J. Tobin of the Coaster Brilliant Star who arrived last Friday on his ninth trip this season. He is a hustler and no mistake. Two Strange Whalers. Today at 1 p.m. two strange whalers arrived in port from Norway. Their names are the Hankin and Grib, and they put into Galway, Ireland, on their way. They are 8 1/2 days from that port and left Norway on June 19th. Both are fine vessels of their class and are bound to Seven Islands in the Gulf of St. Lawrence to prosecute the whale fishery there. Both put in here short of coal and Mr. Tasker Cook, the Norwegian Consul, is looking after them. They have their powder supply on board. REID'S BOATS. The Argyle left Placentia to-day for the west. The Selway is north of Twillingate. The Clyde arrived at Lewisporte at 4 p.m. yesterday and sailed again this a.m. for the south. The Dundee left Port Blandford at 7.20 a.m. to-day. Trade Returns.

The Board of Trade returns show the value of the imports into the United Kingdom for the six months ended June 30, was £234,124,058, a decrease of £282,833 as compared with a corresponding period for 1910. The exports amounted to £223,668,297, with an increase compared to the similar period of last year of £19,082,574.

Big Forest Fires.

Funeral of Mrs. Lloyd.

The funeral of the late Mrs. W. F. Lloyd took place at 3 p.m. yesterday from her late residence, "Escasonia." A number of representative citizens were present including the editors of the daily papers and the staff of the Evening Telegram. The remains were enclosed in a handsome casket which contained many floral tributes. The undertaker was Mr. Andrew Carnell, and interment was at the Church of England Cemetery. Rev. Canon White officiated in the Mortuary Chapel and at the graveside.

Banker Does Well.

The Belleoram banker, Grayling, Capt. Rumpke, arrived here yesterday morning with her mailbag packed and carried away. She was a week on the Banks and secured 350 qts. on the banks after about a week's fishing, and had been at Bay Bulls for bait, but securing none there left Saturday for Carbonear to get a supply. When off Cape St. Francis, Saturday evening, it became stormy and during the night she was hit by a small sea and suffered the damage alluded to, while some of her canvas was torn. She will get repairs here.
