**LONDON, To-Day.**  
Privy Council Lords decided the contract between Commercial Cable Co. and Government of Newfoundland of February 1909 is valid and binding on Newfoundland Government. It was a contract entered into by the administration of Bond before his Government was turned out and that of Morris installed. Under that contract Commercial Cable Co. laid two cables to Newfoundland and broke up cable monopoly that had existed in Newfoundland for forty years. Upon the Morris administration coming into power they repudiated the contract, the Supreme Court in Newfoundland sustained the repudiation but the Lords now reverse that decision with costs to be paid by Newfoundland Government.

**STOCKHOLM, To-Day.**  
Finals in six events completed at the Olympic yesterday and of 36 points States captured 13, England 6, Germany 6, Canada 3, Australia 3, Finland 3, France 3, States and Germany had the honor of making a clean sweep in weight putting and 200 meters swimming back stroke respectively. England won greatest race at the Olympic so far 1500 meters run, Finland won 5000 meters, while Canadian Hodges took 1500 meter swim. Hawaii Kabanamoku 100 meter swim.
