LIVERPOOL, Oct. 6.

Sir Thomas Lipton has sailed for New York, and is prepared to again challenge for the America's cup. This statement of Sir Thomas, that he is about to make a fourth attempt to win back the cup, confirms a recent rumor that he intended to issue another challenge. Since the last race in 1906 a new code of rules has come into force, and it is to consider their effects there in connection with American yacht clubs that Sir Thomas is now going to America.

FIFESHIRE, Oct. 6.

"The British Government will not how to such threats as the Unionist leaders made in Ulster," declared Asquith, speaking on Home Rule. "They had raised the spirit of lawlessness, but they must not imagine they could confine their doctrine to a case which happened to be politically convenient at the moment." He continued, "If what four-fifths of the Irish people demand is not granted, and if Irishmen see their long cherished aspirations frustrated, they may turn and say we will take the law in our own hands. No body of responsible politicians ever struck a more deadly blow at the foundations of democratic government." Asquith declared to-day that he lost all hope that the unspeakable calamity of war might be averted by the Powers working together with careful and loyal means for the preservation of peace, in addressing his constituents. He said he could say no more at present than that everything was being done to prevent such an immeasurable catastrophe. He admitted that not for a long time had the international horizon wore such a threatening aspect as to-day.

PARIS, Oct. 6.

A favorable response to France's suggestion of intervention in the Balkans, was received from Britain to-day. At the same time the British Government suggests that whereas intervention at Constantinople should be made by the great Powers acting as a unit, the intervention at the Balkan capital should be left to Austria and Russia. The German foreign minister accepted the proposal on behalf of Germany, and now only awaits formal word of confirmation from the German Emperor.

Coal Steamer Arrives.

The S. S. Origen, Capt. Wang, arrived in port from Sydney on Saturday night. The passage occupied 40 hours during which strong gales were encountered. She brought 1,775 tons of coal to A. J. Harvey & Co. by which she was chartered to make out here. After unloading the steamer will load fish for Mediterranean port. Neither the captain or ship were ever here before.

The Origen is a cargo and passenger boat and for the last twenty years has been running in the South American Fruit trade. The steamer is 1,662 tons gross, 1,059 net, and was built in Aberdeen in 1888.

Inebriate Creates Alarm.

Saturday night some unknown 'split' lifted a bottle of spirits from the pocket of a man who was lying down on a wharf helplessly drunk. When the inebriate woke he hurried to Water Street in a frenzied state and continued to yell out, "I am robbed." He was quieted by citizens who believed the fellow had been victimized of some money, but on asking were informed that he had lost his best friend which was a bottle of liquor. The citizens were much dismayed over the yarn spun by the intoxicated joker.

Girl Escapes From Orphanage.

Lizzie Critch, a fourteen-year-old inmate of the Church of England Orphanage ran away from the institution a few days ago. She had been wandering about the city up to yesterday, when being exhausted from hunger and fatigue, she surrendered herself at the police station where she was given food and lodgings. We understand the unfortunate deserter will not be taken back to the Orphanage. The police are endeavouring to get in touch with the relatives of the girl, if any, to look after her.

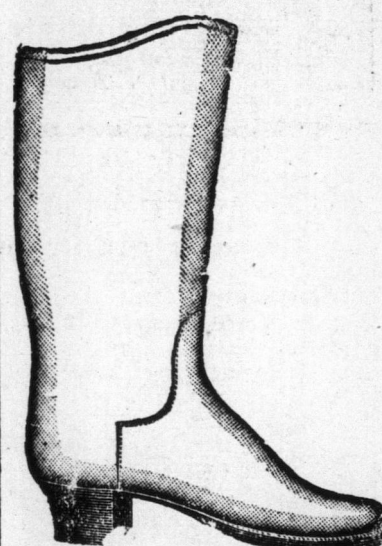

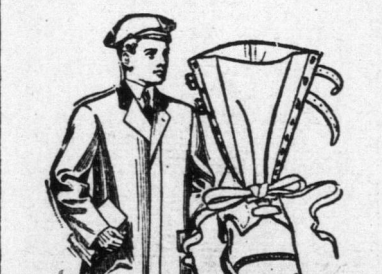

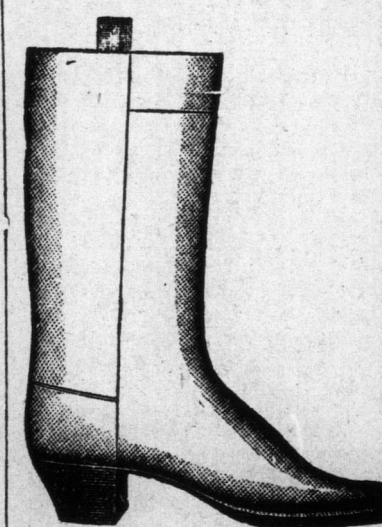

Myasinski, a millionaire member of the Upper House in the Russian parliament, died suddenly at St. Petersburg, on learning that \$350,000 of his firm's money had disappeared.

During a reception to the released suffragettes at Clapham, Mrs. Duval said that if she was present with a revolver at one of Lloyd George's meetings she would unhesitatingly shoot him.

A despatch from Constantinople asserts that the Porte has declared that it would reject a proffer of European intervention for the settlement of the Balkan question, and would regard such an offer as an unfriendly act.

LUSANNE, Switzerland, Oct. 6.

The Turko-Italian treaty of peace, now awaiting ratification, provides for Turkish recognition of Italian Government, it is stated, is to pay an indemnity to Turkey, and also to recognize the religious authority of the Khalif over the Musslimans of Tripoli.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 6.

In an engagement at Berana, near the Montenegrin frontier, between Turks and Montenegrins, the latter were repulsed, according to advices received here. The Turkish Government, it is understood, views this affair as practically beginning hostilities.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.

Four American marines were killed and six wounded, when the American forces took the town of Coyotepe from Nicaraguan rebels, according to a cablegram received by Minister Castillo from the Minister for Foreign Affairs at Nicaragua. Neither the State Department nor the Navy has received any word to that effect.

MONTREAL, Oct. 6.

No official confirmation could be secured from C. P. R. officials concerning the report that the Railway is about to acquire the famous Peninsular and Oriental Navigation Company, thus adding nearly a hundred steamers to its present fleet, and enabling it to girdle the entire globe. The story is published in the Financial Times.

BELGRADE, Oct. 6.

In an address to the Khupshina, which opened to-day, King Peter declared that the mobilization of the Serbian army was due to the attitude of Turkey in sending troops to the Serbian frontier. He added Serbia would do everything in its power to establish real permanent peace in the Balkans. The address, which has been sent to all the foreign legations, except Turkey, was loudly cheered.

LONDON, Oct. 6.

A correspondent of the Dublin Times says that it learns that Lord Macdonald, Earl Dunraven and other influential men are making a gallant effort to save the Irish Home Rule Bill, on the basis of a radical amendment of those clauses most objectionable to Irish Unionists. The correspondent adds that he believes that William O'Brien, leader of the Independent Nationalists, is greatly interested in the movement.
