

Volunteers Parade.

On arrival at the C. L. B. Armoury last night His Excellency the Governor was greeted with the National Anthem which was sung by the large number present.

The volunteers, including those who have been accepted, and those who are yet to be examined, were drawn up and inspected by His Excellency. After going through some drill under command of Capt. N. Alderice they paraded through the city headed by the C. L. B. and C. G. C. bugle bands and the Highlanders pipers. The line of march was along LeMarchant Road, Patrick, Water and Cochrane Streets, Military and Harvey Roads to the Armoury. On return they were again inspected by His Excellency who was very pleased with their showing.

Major Franklin then announced that the Volunteers will take the Oath of Allegiance on Monday next, and be listed as regular soldiers. He then called for twenty volunteers to proceed to Pleasantville to-day to look after the preliminary arrangements for camp, and the request met with a hearty response.

The National Anthem was then played and after cheers had been given for His Excellency the company was dismissed.

TO REMEDY CARGO.

The S. S. Gloria de Larrinaga, Capt. Ferrell, put into port yesterday afternoon. She was five days out from Montreal to Hull, England, with a cargo of grain. Coming down the St. Lawrence and passing through the Belle Isle Straits adverse weather was met and the ship's cargo shifted so much that the Captain decided to come to St. John's to have matters adjusted.

Messrs. Bowring Bros., Ltd., are the agents, while the work of handling the ship's cargo is in charge of Stevedore T. Kennedy.

The Gloria de Larrinaga was built by Russell and Company, Glasgow, in 1908. She belongs to the Miguel de Larrinaga Line, Liverpool. She is 4,649 tons gross; 2,972 tons net; 405.1 feet long; 52.0 beam and 25.6 deep. The ship is making her maiden trip here.
