celebrated last night with great eclat. It was a memorable event which will be historic hereafter. The city was ablaze with illuminations and fireworks and from start to finish there was one continuous round of festivity with people, as practically the entire populace, young and old, turned out to witness the demonstration, and from the humblest home to the biggest mansion a spirit of jubilation was manifest. As arranged, the different organizations and bands assembled within the Cathedral grounds and at 7.30 they took up their posi-tions and the start was made. The order was:

After leaving the Cathedral grounds the parade, followed by a multitude of people, wended its way down Military Road to Rawlins' Cross, thence via Queen's Road, Theatre Hill and New Gower Street, Hamilton Street to Patrick Street. As the parade moved west, the immense crowd increased. Leaving Patrick Street the next route taken was down Water Street, up Queen's St. and then by way of New Gower, Duckworth, Ordnance, Gower and Cochrane Streets to Military Road and then back to the starting point. The Papal Delegate, Archbishop Roche and visiting clergy went through the city in motor cars and were given a right royal reception all along the route, especially passing the triumphal arches, R. C. Halls and buildings, which showed an elaborate display of bunting and electric lights, and also at some private residences which were profusely dressed with bunting and brilliantly lit. Cheer bunting succeeded cheer and fireworks of all descriptions ascended to the heavens

as the esteemed dignitaries passed by. TRIUMPHAL ARCHES.

Five triumphal arches were erected and added in no small degree to make the entire scene a spectacular one. The first arch visited was that on Rawlins' Cross. It was of beautiful design, handsomely embellished and of artistic finish. Prominently disof artistic finish. Frommently displayed was the Archiepiscopal mitre and coat of arms and the words "Long Live Archbishop Roche." Another pretty arch next approached was that on New Gower and Adelaide Streets. It was neatly erected, surmounted by a cross picked in varimounted by a cross picked in vari-colored electric lights and contained appropriate mottoes. A most strik-ing and original arch was that erect-ed at the Junction of Casey and New Gower Streets. It represented the Cathedral with its twin towers, beautifully illuminated with electric mot-toes and its rendition of the chimes of bells last night was of more than ordinary interest. The Patrick St. arch was really a beauty with its electrical festoons and attractive inscriptions, but there was nothing to compare with the last arch visited. We now refer to St. Joseph's arch situated off Fort William. At the approach the societies opened out to allow the dignitaries to pass down to the arch while the bands discoursed the British marching tune, "It's a Long Way to Tipperary." At the entrance to the structure stood a guard of honor from the C.C.C. with fixed bayonets. The dignitaries on arrival were accorded a hearty reception. Sky rockets ascended from Fort William and the old railway yard nearby while salvos of musketry belched forth in all directions. The arch was an imitation of St. John the Baptist arch fronting the Cathedral grounds and a good one at that. It stands second to none for beauty of design of bells last night was of more than ordinary interest. The Patrick St. second to none for beauty of design and excellent finish. Of striking at-traction are the four marble pillars twined with the Papal colors, yellow and white. Across the main arch was "Newfoundland is proud of her and white. Other mottoes which caught the eye quickly on either side over the sub-arches were "E.P.R." (His Grace) and "P.F.S." (Monsignor Stagni). The two principal pillars contains latin quotations meaning "many blessings, many gifts" to the new Archbishop. On the bases of the pillars were appropriate and pleasing legends. The cornices showed a good finish. The whole presented a magnificent appearance, illuminated with vari-coloured electric bulbs and a lavish display of bunting while the vari-coloured electric bulbs and a lavish display of bunting while the entire grounds lined with trees, evergreen and flags added much to the excellence of the scene. ellence of the scene.

A grand pyrotechnic display was given from the Palace grounds and also from the Central Fire Hall after all the arches had been reviewed and the societies and bands had dispersed.
