**MINARD'S LINIMENT LUMBER-
MAN'S FRIEND.**

The following notice was read at the Masses yesterday in the Catholic Churches of the city.

"It has been recently brought to the notice of His Grace the Archbishop that collections for various church objects have been taken up in the city for some time past without the necessary authorization. This practice is open to serious objections on many grounds, not the least of which is that there is no guarantee that money thus donated are really devoted to the purposes for which they are given."

It will be remembered that some years ago a rule was made to the effect that no such collections were to be taken up in St. John's without the written sanction of the church authorities. His Grace now deems it expedient to rescind this rule, and to impress upon the people that no requests for contributions for church purposes are to be headed unless the written permission of the ecclesiastical authorities is produced. His Grace wishes it to be understood that no objection is to be made to any way to restrict or interfere with the generously disposed in their contributions to all deserving church works; it is intended solely to guard against the irregularities and annoyances inseparable from indiscriminate, irresponsible and unauthorized collecting for church purposes.

Saturday afternoon the four importers turned up in force at the meeting which the Food Control Board called in its rooms to hear Mr. F. K. Morrow, of the Canadian Food Board, who had come to St. John's to make representations on behalf of that organization as to the situation on the subject of the importation of human food. Mr. Morrow was accompanied by the chairman of the Food Control Board, Sir Patrick McGrath, presided, supported by his colleagues, Mr. H. W. LeMessurier, C.M.G., and Mr. G. F. Grimes, M.H.A., and besides Mr. Morrow there were also present Hons. John Harvey and Mr. G. Winter, Mayor Gosling and Messrs. F. H. Steer, J. Brownling, G. Kerrington, J. J. O'Donnell, V. O'Donnell, E. Deming, J. B. Urquhart, M. Green and J. Peter. The chairman introduced Mr. Morrow, and read the letters from the Canadian authorities which he brought along as credentials after which he invited Mr. Morrow to state the matters which he had come to discuss. These were three in number, (1) the importation of human food, (2) the importation of purchases, and (3) the manipulation of prices. The visitor reviewed these matters at length, indicating the aspects from which these phases of the subject were viewed by the Ottawa Department, and incidentally referring to the view of the American Food Administration in relation thereto. He also gave a brief outline of useful information, and exhibited some samples of the products made from the materials now in use in Canada.
