To Christian virtue. While instructing others she did not forget her own soul. She was a model Religious, a strict observer of her holy Rule, a lover of Prayer. At any time during her free moments she might be seen absorbed in prayer before the altar. Simple in disposition, amiable with a refined sense of the virtue of gentleness, charitable towards all, ever ready to help others, meek and mild like her Divine Spouse, is it any wonder that she won the esteem and affection of those with whom she came in contact, and was a friend of all? She was one of the few to whom God gave the great privilege of celebrating her Golden Jubilee of her Religious Profession, which she relebrated with joy on September 19th, 1909.
