





The new rule should prevent much acrimonious discussion amongst spectators, many of whom found the old law-simple though it was-an abstruse problem. Less Noise Now. Regarding the new method of throwing the ball in from touch, it is diffi cult for one to understand why the old procedure was dispensed with. Whereas, before, it was an offence if a player taking the throw-in did not stand on the touch-line when delivering the ball, it shall now be reckoned as noncompliance with the laws of the game if the throw-in is taken when the touch-line is encroached upon by the player throwing in the ball. He shall now stand outside the line when throwing the ball over his head when as before both hands must be used On consideration it will be understood that it should now be easier for a linesman, and also the spectators, to observe when the throw-in is properly taken. When a player taking th throw-in raised his heels the move ment was invariably accompanied b claims for a "foul-shy" award. Play ers, and spectators who claimed this conveniently ignored the fact that the throw-in was taken while the player still covered the line with part of his boots.
