Base Ball Notes.
PROFESSIONAL GAMES.
The Philadelphia and Hartford
played their second championship game

the village vote an extra bonus of
\$50,000 and furnish the right of way
through the corporation.

guages, has recently been established at
Bethlehem. Nearly two thousand years
