THE RESULTS.

Elsewhere in this issue will be found a full report of the returns from all over the Dominion, showing that the Laurier Government has been sustained by a large majority. There will probably be a few changes in the figures given, when later reports come in, but they cannot materially effect the result. The Government majority will be cut down somewhat from what they had at the close of the last session, but it is very much larger than it was when they got into power in 1896. The Tories made large gains in Ontario, but they only got seven seats in Quebec out of 65. Sir Charles Fupper, Hon. Geo. E. Foster, Hugh John MacDonald and Dr. Montague went down before the flood. The Tories of East Elgin are consoling themselves over the result in their own county, while the Grits take their consolation from the general results. The consequence is that both are good natured, while both feel a certain amount of regret. Now that the fight is over, let us drop all politics, and devote the next five years to the advancement and good of our beloved country, and our own financial and social interests. The majority of the electors have signified their desire to continue the Reform administration, under the leadership of Sir Wilfred Laurier.

There does not seem to be any news this week. That is local news. Politics seem to take the place of everything. No one has gone away who did not have to, there hasn't even been a good row over the elections. This sort of work will ruin the independent papers, if it continues much longer.

To our minds one of the most pleasing and encouraging features of the political contest just ended, is the almost universal good nature that has prevailed throughout. So far as Aylmer and Malahide is concerned a few ho and hasty words may have been spoken, but we do not know of a single instance of any serious differences of opinion, calculated to make bad friends. Both parties worked hard and fought it out to the end, then shook hands and quit. We are proud of the citizens of Aylmer, both Grit and Tory, for the display of so much good sense. May it always remain so.

We do not often pay any attention to any article sent in to us without the name of the writer is attached, but we received one this week that is of so great importance and of such a serious character, that we give it below verbatim, leaving out only the name of the locality mentioned, and trust it will be the means of avoiding the shedding of blood or hair. Possibly we may kill three or four birds with one stone, if there are any others in the same danger. We must confess to a very strong feeling of sympathy for Mr. G. O. E. Casey of West Elgin. He may have been careless in the performance of his duties of late, he may have been hasty and unwise in coming out as an independent candidate against the choice of the convention, he may have been wrong in these and other instances, but now that his party has been returned to power, with such a strong

backing, they can afford to be generous, forgive his mistakes, and give him a good berth, when the opportunity presents itself. From what we know of Sir Wilfred Laurier, we believe he is just the man to take this view of the matter, and we hope he will.

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BY-LAW No. 442.

A By-Law to authorize the purchase by the Town of Aylmer of the Aylmer Electric and Manufacturing Company's plant and premises for electric lighting purposes, and for the erection, extension and equipment of the said plant, and to provide for the issue of Debentures of the said Town to the amount of \$20,000, and to raise the sum required therefor.

Whereas it is advisable that the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Aylmer should purchase the Aylmer Electric and Manufacturing Company's plant and premises for electric lighting purposes, and to erect, extend and equip the said plant.

And whereas in order thereto it will be necessary to issue debentures of the said municipality for the sum of \$20,000, as hereinafter provided (which is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this by-law) the proceeds of the said debentures to be applied to the purpose aforesaid and to no other.

And whereas it is desirable to issue the said debentures at one time and to make the principal of the debt repayable by yearly sums during the period of twenty years, being the currency of the said debentures; the said yearly sums being of such respective amounts that the aggregate amount payable in each year for principal and interest in respect of said debt shall be as nearly as possible equal to the amount so payable in each of the other nineteen years of said period as shown by schedule "A" hereto attached.

And whereas the total amount required by the Municipal Act to be raised annually by special rate for paying the said debt and interest as hereinafter provided is \$1471.64.

And whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the Town of Aylmer, according to the last revised assessment roll thereof is \$700,875.

And whereas the amount of the existing debt of the said municipality is \$19,070.53, whereof no part of the principal or interest is in arrears.

Therefore the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Aylmer hereby enacts as follows:

(1) The Municipal Council of the said Town of Aylmer shall expend the sum of \$20,000 in the purchase of the Aylmer Electric and Manufacturing Company's plant and premises for electric lighting purposes, and for the erection, extension and equipment of the said plant, and for the purpose of raising the said sum, debentures of the said Town to the amount of \$20,000 as aforesaid, in sums of not less than \$100 each, shall be issued on the twenty-eighth day of December, 1900, each of which debentures shall be dated on the date of the issue thereof, and shall be payable within twenty years thereafter on the twenty-eighth day of December, 1900, at

the office of the Treasurer of the said Town of Aylmer.

(2) Each of the said debentures shall be signed by the Mayor of the said Town of Aylmer, and by the Treasurer thereof of the said Town of Aylmer, and the clerk shall attach thereto the corporate seal of the municipality.

(3) During the currency of the said debentures there shall be raised annually by special rate on all the rateable property in the said Town of Aylmer, the sum of \$1471.64 for the purpose of paying the amount due in each year for principal and interest in respect of the said debt.

(4) This By-law shall take effect on the tenth day of December, 1900.

(5) The votes of the electors of the said Town of Aylmer shall be taken on this by-law at the following times and places, that is to say:

On the third day of December next, commencing at the hour of nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continuing till five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day, by the following deputy returning officer:

In Polling Sub-Division Number One, at the office of John Anson McCausland, King street, with John Anson McCausland as deputy returning officer.

In Polling Sub-Division Number Two, at the Town Hall, John Street, with Janus Bradley as deputy returning officer.

In Polling Sub-Division Number Three, at the office of Miller de Boshoua, Talbot street, with Edward Allen Miller as deputy returning officer.

(6) On Saturday, the first day of December, the Mayor of the said Town of Aylmer shall attend at the Council Chamber at twelve o'clock, noon, to appoint persons to attend at the various polling places aforesaid, and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting or opposing the passing of this By-law, respectively.

(7) The Clerk of the Council of the said Town of Aylmer shall attend at his office in the Town Hall at ten o'clock in the forenoon of Tuesday, the fourth day of December, to sum up the number of votes for and against the said By-law.

Dated at the Town Hall, in the Town of Aylmer, the fifth day of November, A.D. 1900.

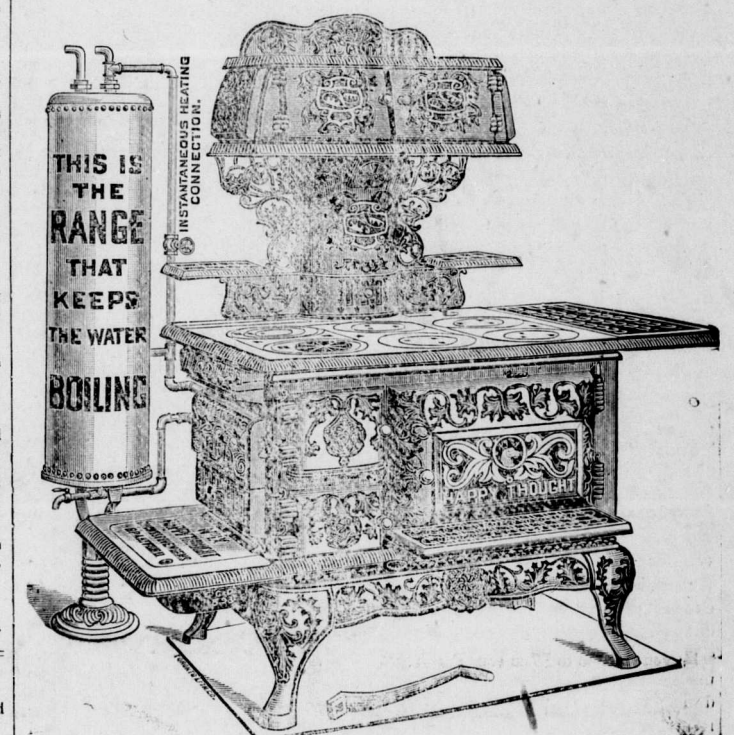
