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LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Over 100 seats have been subscribed already for the performance of Emma Juch's company on Friday next.

—Judge Mackenzie, of Sarnia, held Division Court in the court house this morning. A number of small cases were disposed of.

—Ald. Moule effected the sale of the Horton street school property yesterday for \$1,800. The purchaser was Mr. O. E. Brenner.

—James Walker was discharged by Judge Elliot this morning on the charge of obtaining a rig from J. S. Marshall under false pretences.

—The Fall Convention of the Y. M. C. A. commenced this afternoon in Stratford. London is represented by Secretary Sayer and several delegates.

—The strike of the New York Central brakemen is not affecting the trains here to any great extent. No. 3 was one hour and 40 minutes late this morning.

—Mrs. Palmer, who has been looked after by the city for some time past, applied for admission to the hospital to-day. Her recovery will be quick and her children will be sent to the home.

—After watching the men at work on York street laying cedar blocks this morning, U. S. Consul Leonard took up the position of the men and leveled a number of blocks to the satisfaction of the foreman.

—Mrs. Lambert, the woman who was sent to Stratford a short time ago, has been returned to the city by her friends in a private car. An effort is being made to have the woman admitted to the Conventual Home.

—The testimonial concert to Miss Ziegler and Mr. Williams to-night promises to be a great success. As to the attendance and the musicality. The violinist, Mr. Yunk, is a special attraction. He is a superb performer.

—The Messrs. Marshall Bros., of this city, were present at the auction sale, Montreal, yesterday, when Mr. Thomas J. Potter sold by auction 4,676 packages of tea, brought from Yokohama, Japan, by the C. F. R. K. train via Vancouver.

—Augustus Anderson and Thomas Millot were charged before Squire Jarvis yesterday afternoon with trespassing on the G. T. R. property at Thornedale and assaulting Section Foreman Francis. They were fined \$1 and costs in each case. In the first they were given time to pay and in the second they were committed.

—Mr. William Hunter, of Grey street, met with a serious accident at noon to-day. While engaged in cleaning a window on the second floor of the Canada Savings and Loan building he lost his balance and fell to the ground. He alighted on his feet, but received a severe strain in his back and some internal injury. He was conveyed to his home and medical attendance called in.

—At the annual meeting of the Western branch of the Women's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church in Canada, held in Chatham yesterday the following officers were elected: President, Mrs. D. Burns, St. Thomas; first vice, Mrs. Dr. Fowler, London; second vice, Mrs. Phelps, Mount Pleasant; recording secretary, Mrs. J. H. —The Improvement Committee. The meeting of No. 2 Committee of the Board of Education was attended last evening by Trustees Turner (chairman), Brady, Jeffery, Craig and Cook. Secretary Abbott and Engineer Tracy. It was decided on motion of Trustee Cook that the additional insurance on the school building should be distributed equally among those companies having the lowest amount at present. The Chairman decided to return with a view of consulting the City Solicitor with a view of expropriating the lot purchased by Mr. Maguire on the Central school property.

—The Campbell's Confession. The recent murder trials have set people recalling reminiscences of former murders. Among others thus engaged is a correspondent who writes: "Did Thebe Campbell ever confess to the murder of her husband?"

—Inquiry from our authorities. A view is taken to show that she never made a written confession of the deed, but that she made numerous statements acknowledging her guilt. She had made several different statements of the affair that but gave what she afterwards said credence. Previous to her execution she wrote to the matron, the sister Mrs. Doyle, word that she wanted to make a full confession. The Crown Attorney was communicated with, but for some reasons the confession was not received. In her final statement she had implicated her paramour, Nelson Coyle, but her word went for nothing. In order to prove that she was not a liar, she was taken to the condemned woman connected to become a party to a scheme by which Coyle might incriminate himself. Thebe Campbell was pointed to his cell and talked to him of the crime with a reporter in the adjoining cell short-handling the conversation. It was generally believed that sufficient evidence was found against the man Coyle, but when he came to trial the jury acquitted him.
