"IMAGINATION IN LITERATURE."

Rev. Dr. Milligan at the First Presbyterian Church-An Evening With the Great Poets

The First Presbyterian Church held in the first division upon a question a fair sized and responsive audience in the consideration of which Sir last evening, when Rev. Dr. Milligan, Charles Tupper has taken any part, a Toronto, delivered his lecture on "Imagination in Literature." Rev. J. G. Stuart occupied the pulpit in the absence of the pastor, Rev. W. J. Clark, who has not entirely recovered from C. Barron, the organist, played several very pleasing selections. The lecture itself was a rich mental treat, during which the lecturer vivisected the works of all the great poets, analyzing and comparing their styles and grouping them according to their respective merits. Browning's poetry contained all the essentials of what was ideally true, and its function was uniformly educative. It was the standard or science of imaginative truth that was the aim of all poetry, and that truth should not be represented in abstract form or it became philosophic. A great poet must be a philosopher, but a man might be a great philosopher and not a great poet. Every great historian must be a poet as well as a philosopher. Scenery in poetry furnishes the vehicle through which eternal ideal truth is brought home upon the soul. This poetry was in two kinds, scenic simple, and scenic composite. In scenic simple the poet simply held up the mir-ror to nature. Wordsworth was perhaps the most renowned poet in this Quotations illustrative of scenic simple were given from Wordsworth and Mrs. Browning. The scenic composite is where the scene was used as found in nature, but associated with it is some art or some association connected with human life, and the natural and human elements are blended to produce the effect. The lecturer pointed out certain great educative results of the cultivation of the imagination, quoting from Tennyson, Dante, Shakespeare and Browning, to show the deep scientific learning displayed. Poetry also cultivated the powers of volition, and in conclusion the speaker advised all readers and students to read systematically and assiduously. BIG STRIKE OF GARMENT MAK-
