LONDON WINS.

"Out of the game you go." was Umpire England's instructions to Dan Lowney in Saturday's game, after the agile shortstop had reached the initial bag on a pass in the fifth inning, and was caught napping off the bag by Hagerman. It was one of those decisions that calls for quick judgment and to many it remains only within the umpire's quick sightedness to de tect the play. It was a close decision and Lowney showed his disapprova by running into the diamond towar England and using such epithets that England told him he would have t get out of the game. The next man was easily retired, making the side out. Lowney picked up his glove an walked to his position, but Englan was firm and called to Lowney to come in. The latter doggedly accepted th turn of affairs and sent Morrissey to short field.

Up to this time London had score nine runs to two by the visitors, and Lowney probably was vexed at th wretched field work of his team in th fifth inning of the London side. Such slipshod work has not been seen or the home diamond this season. Th Babes should change their appellation and assume the name of "The Muff ers." Two errors by Snyder, a muf by Jones of a difficult fly, two misplay by Phelps and a balk by Watkins al lowed London to score six runs or two hits. Only one run was sent across the plate on a hit, and after the inning ended it was a welcome relief. The sixth inning also began with a base on balls and a muff by Conklin, both base runners scoring on Carey's three-bagger. Morrissey's only change of handling the ball was in the eighth,

when he fumbled it. The two games played this trip by Chatham have been the worst since the organization of the Canadian League. The personnel of the team continues to undergo changes. Wat-kins, the twirler who was with the Bay City club, pitched his first game for the Chathams. He had an excellent drop ball, which fooled the home nine, and by better support would likely have pulled out the game. With three Chatham players on bases in the sixth he placed a ball between left and center, which was slowly fielded, and enabled him to take two bases and score the three runs.

Kuehne was on first, but could do nothing with the bat, although he drew two passes. Phelps was behind the bat, and on a forced run in the fifth, with his foot on the home plate, he touched Keenan, the ball dropping from his hand in doing so. In the same inning, with the bases still full, Carey was forced out at the plate on Hagerman's hit to Watkins. Phelps endeavored to make a double by heading off Hagerman at first, and hit the runner on the back with the ball, which bounded into the field and allowed Lohman and Ward to score. The only error by the home team

was Carey's drop of Jones' fly in the fourth, the batter scoring on Phelps' triple. The tall fielder evened up the misplay in the ninth, when he caught one of the hardest line drives made this season by Jones.
