Her crew were rescued by the British bark Seafarer (Capt. Farmer), from San Francisco, Jan. 12, for Hull, and transferred by her to the tug Oceana, which has landed them at Portland.

DONS KICK UP A ROW. Madrid, May 12.-Dispatches just rebeived here show that disorders, due to the anti-taxation agitation, have occurred at Barcelona and at Seville. The rioting was particularly severe in Barcelona, where a crowd threw up barricades in the streets and exchanged musketry fire with a body of gendarmes. Shots were fired from a number of houses. Several gendarmes were A number of the rioters were arrested. Order has now been restored, but it is rumored that martial law will be proclaimed there.

Austria Wants a Slice of Canadian Commerce - The Manitoulin and and Lake Shore Scheme-Election of Officers.

WOMAN QUESTION

Very Much Alive at the M. E. Conference in Chicago.

Chicago, May 11.-The question of the rights of women in the general con-ference is not a dead and buried issue. At least, it was revived with unexpected suddenness yesterday morning, when the report of the commission on the organic law of the denomination came up for discussion.
Dr. Buckley, of course, was ready

with his speech of opposition to the admission of women, but evidently he was not on the popular side, and all who followed him on the same side of the question were both tame and weak. Dr. Potts, of Detroit, made a telling speech, in which he virtually accused Dr. Buckley of resorting solely to parliamentary tactics in defense of his position, as a last but hopeless resort.

Bishop Thoburn, of India, made his report yesterday, and indicated by weakness of voice and lack of energy the great strain under which he has labored for fourteen years. He suggested that it might be his last report, and pleaded for two colleagues. He received great applause when he suggested that their salaries be placed lower and that his own be cut with them.

The committee on book concerns has decided that some of the denominational papers must be discontinued, where not self-supporting. No action has been taken as to the book depositories, but some of them, such as the Detroit, may be discontinued.

WOMEN PLAGUES

Dr. Treves Tells How With Morbid Curiosity They Invaded Hospitals.

London, May 11.—The storm which the eminent surgeon, Dr. Treves raised by publicly declaring that "the plague of women" at the Cape was worse than the "plague of flies" shows no sign of abating. Interviewed, Dr.

Treves said: 'How any reasoning person can possibly have construed my remarks into a sweeping condemnation of all women workers at the front, I cannot, for the life of me, understand, for, of course, nothing half so foolish or unjust was conveyed in what I said. Probably no one living has a deeper sense of the splendid work which many large-hearted, unselfish women, professional and amateur alike, are

doing in South Africa.
"But," and Dr. Treves brought the clinched right hand into the palm of his left-"but when I explain the condition of affairs at Cape Town you will be able to judge whether I was justified in entering a strong protest. Cape Town was, at the time at which spoke, packed with women idlers, the majority of them 'society' 'smart' people, who, yearning for new excitement, had come out to South Africa to make holiday. The condition of affairs brought about by the presence of these ladies, was an absolute

disgrace. "The hotels at Cape Town were crammed with these people in the enon a large scale, and if a sick or front in search of accommodation he had not the slightest chance of getting into a decent hotel. These ladies had not the slightest pretext for being

in South Africa. "That, however, was not the worst side of their presence. When dinner parties and other junketings grew wearisome, they would make up par-ties to visit the hospitals. 'What shall we do today? 'Oh, let's go and see the wounded,' would be the prepara-tion for an invasion of the hospitals and incalculable amount of interference with the work of the medical staff. Officers in charge of wounded


