—Capt. H. J. Snelgrove, of the Cobourg

Some New Tramps in Town.
A trio of tramps attracted P. C. Howie's
attention on Egerton street near the car
shops yesterday afternoon. They were all
the more conspicuous from the fact that
one of their number was a woman.

She ran into a house near by, and after
getting someone to telephone for the
patrol, Mr. Howie started after the tramps.
The wagon brought out Detectives Rider
and Nickle, and they joined in the chase
after the men, who had started across
the railroad track and into the swamps
to the east of the city. One of the men got
all tangled up in a barbed wire fence and fell
an easy prey to the fast pursuing police-
men. One of his comrades became hope-
lessly stuck in the mud in the swamp, a
little further on, and he too succumbed.

The third gave Mr. Howie a run out to the
old race course, and ultimately got away.
The two men caught are of the Burke-
Wilson variety, and gave their names as
Geo. Egan and Geo. Powell, and Buffalo as
the place of their activity. Egan was the
man who chased the woman. On Powell
was found some jewelry—a woman's
brooch and a small gold basket, pendant
from a pin.

Business at Osgoode Hall.
The Court of Appeal began its May sit-
tings Tuesday. The Queen's Bench and
Common Pleas Divisional Courts begin
their sittings next Monday, and the
Chancery sittings for the trial of the
will be begun on the same day. Next Thurs-
day will be the last day for setting down
cases for these three courts.

In High Court of Justice—Chapman vs.
Shawell.—Judgment on appeal by the
plaintiff from an order of G. J. J. 4, of
missing the application of the appellant to
be appointed receiver, without security, of
the rents and profits of certain lands, the
appellant being an execution creditor of
the defendant, who had an interest in the
lands as tenant by the entirety. The
marriage took place in 1858. The chief
justice held that, having regard to the pro-
visions of sec. 4, sub-sec. 3 of the Devolu-
tion of Estates Act, unless the defendant
declared his election to take an interest
as tenant by the entirety, in the time
limited, the property of the wife must be
disposed of under the provisions of sec. 9,
and the right of the husband to possession
of the property of his wife was gone. Ap-
peal dismissed with costs. Walter Read
for the appellant; Magee, Q.C., for the respondent.

London West Council.
At the last meeting of the London West
Council Whit Lancaster & Co. presented a
claim of \$15 for boats during the freshet on
March 24. The hiring of the boats was not
authorized and the account was filed.
For \$50 for services rendered by Electric Light
Company on March 19, 91. Filed. Not
authorized.

The Alert Baseball Club asked permis-
sion to erect a fence against the break-
water at the Tecumseh Park. Granted.
J. B. Allen's request that the council
remove sidewalk of his lot was referred to
the board of works.

A. R. Murdoch, H. Horn and T. J.
Guymer applied for a drain or culvert on
Osgoode street. Referred to board of works
with power.

An account of J. R. Gurd of \$19.84 for
relief was referred to Chairman Collins of
the finance committee to report.

Collector J. R. Lord reported \$2,600 un-
collected taxes. It was voted that the col-
lector be authorized to return the roll by
June 1.

A Nice Point as to Tickets.
An important judgment was given by
the Court of Appeal for Ontario yesterday
in the case of Beaver vs. the Grand Trunk
Railway. According to this judgment a
conductor has no right to put a passenger
off the train for failing to show his ticket.

The plaintiff, Beaver, is a merchant at Six
Nations postoffice, in the county of Hal-
dmand, and purchased a return ticket over
the defendants' railway from Caledonia to
Detroit. On the return trip he was ejected
from the train in which he was travel-
ing, having mislaid his ticket; and in this
action he claimed damages to the amount
of \$1,000 for the trespass. The trial judge
held that the conductor of the train was
justified in ejecting the plaintiff, having
first demanded the ticket or the amount of

the fare and having allowed the plaintiff a
reasonable time to pay his way. On appeal,
the Divisional Court reversed this decision
and held that, in the absence of express
conditions requiring the passenger who had
paid his fare and received the ticket to dis-
play the latter on demand, the company
have no right to eject him for failing to do
so. The company took the case to the
Court of Appeal and the majority of the court
agreed with the judgment of the court
below. Mr. Justice Ooster dissenting, hold-
ing that the very purpose of giving a pas-
senger a ticket is that he may prove to the
conductor that he has paid his fare, and
that he takes it with the condition
annexed to it, that he shall produce it
when called upon. The appeal was dis-
missed with costs.

The African Native Choir.
A gentleman who heard the famous
African Native Choir, just after their ar-
rival in this country, writes as follows:
"The audience was immense, every avail-
able seat being occupied, both in the
auditorium and the gallery, while the aisles
were improved with chairs. The talent
of these African singers, natives of Central
and Southern Africa, is perfectly unique, and
especially the Kaffir songs gave one a very
vivid conception of the character of that
remarkable race. The feature about the
concert was the dramatic element running
through it. The talkative women and
their quarrels were very comical, while the
songs, Mo-lo-ke-da, or marching melody,
was intensely realistic. The wedding song,
with its strange antics, and the capture of
the bride gave a very vivid conception of
the immense difference existing between
the ceremony amongst African tribes
and that of the Anglo-Saxon race. Certainly
Christianity, civilization, and the church
had done much for the white races. The
Lord's Prayer, as sung before her Majesty the Queen at Os-
borne, was reproduced with fine and rever-
ent effect by these Christianized heathens.
Altogether the concert was most remark-
able, and presented in the wonderful refine-
ment of voice and manner in the sacred
selections the effect upon these people of
the power of Christianity to elevate the
race. It was a remarkable change from
the wild Kaffir dance to the National
Anthem, "God Save the Queen," and yet
it was only another tribute to the extent
and power of the British Empire, upon
which the sun never sets, for the British
scepter rules no less than 39,837,600 people
in Africa." The plan for this remarkable
attraction opens on Tuesday, May 16.
Nobody should miss this exceptional op-
portunity of hearing the Africans. The
Opera House will doubtless be packed.
