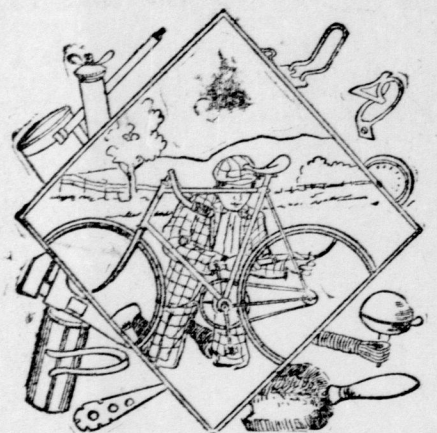

Toronto, June 5, 8 p.m.—The cool wave continues in the Northwest Territories, and while there was no frost last night the low temperature is by no means over. Thunderstorms occurred in Western Ontario, near Lake Huron this morning, and will probably soon become general in the province. The weather continues fine in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 46—54; Calgary, 34—48; Prince Albert, 34—54; Qu'Appelle, 34—46; Winnipeg, 34—46; Port Arthur, 46—72; Parry Sound, 48—84; Toronto, 46—74; Ottawa, 54—78; Montreal, 58—76; Quebec, 56—67; Halifax, 48—72.

Local temperature: The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Wednesday, June 5, were 83.5 and 46.

Today (Thursday) the sun rose at 4:35 a.m. and sets at 7:55 p.m. The moon rises at 10:56 p.m. and sets at 8:40 a.m.

A LOCAL BUDGET.

—Mrs. Robert Allan, over the Bank of Commerce, is visiting her daughter, Mrs. W. J. Neville, Chicago.

—Mr. Adam Nichol, 36 William street, city, has left for Toronto, where he has obtained a good position.

—Mr. A. F. McLaren, M.P., of Stratford, was here yesterday, en route to Michigan to inspect a cement works there.

—Mr. J. F. A. Hutton, lately with the firm of Dickson, Nicholson & Co., will take an important position with S. P. McKinnon & Co., of Toronto.

—Mr. W. B. Legate, 70 Byron avenue, has resumed work with the Rogers Electric Company, after successfully graduating at Woodstock College.

—A change in the L. E. and D. R. R. (Port Stanley branch) timetable goes into effect on June 10. The train now leaving here at 10 o'clock a.m. will depart at 10:25.

—The annual prohibition convention for Ontario will be held at Toronto on July 9. The council of the Dominion Alliance for defendants, appeal from report of master at London, was adjourned for one week.

—Mr. A. Taylor, formerly manager of Oak Hall in this city, has resigned a similar position in Hamilton, and will leave that city about July 1. Mr. Taylor has been in the employ of the Oak Hall establishment for the past twenty years.

—St. Thomas Times: G. W. Down, M. C. R. baggage man, London, and Miss Down, who formerly resided on John street, are in the city. They leave in a few days on a three months' trip to England for the benefit of Miss Down's health.

—Official announcement has finally been made by the Evered-Moore syndicate, of Ontario, who are owners of the London Street Railway, of the purchase of the Detroit and Pontiac Electric Railway Company. The consideration for the road was \$1,050,000.

—The construction of the Colborne at St. James' street sewer is being pushed ahead as rapidly as possible. The sewer will be carried north on Colborne street to Grosvenor, one block farther than was intended. The residents from St. James' street north having petitioned for it. This will make it possible to lay sewers in any section of the northeastern part of the city.

—The late John Ferns, who died on June 4 at the Aged People's Home, was one of the old veterans of the Sikh war (1844-45), and had seen much service under Sir Hugh Gough, Sir Harry Smith (afterwards at Cape Colony), and Sir Henry Harding.
