London Socialist Is Charged With a Serious Crime.

Complainant Is a Young Woman Who Accuses Him With Having Betrayed Her.

Toronto, Sept. 17 .- Robert Roadhouse held forth on Saturday evening to a crowd of several hundred on Temperance street, just west of Yonge, Toronto. Roadhouse was mounted on a small wooden stand, illuminated by a gasoline lamp. He began by referring to the ssassination of President McKinley, and claimed that socialism, or more particularly the Socialist Labor Party, was opposed to the methods of anarchism. There was no use in killing a president, a czar or any other ruler; another man was always ready to step into his place. Mr. Roadhouse then launched into an attack upon trades unions, and ran foul of a trades unionist in the audience, who gave him some back-chat. The trades unionists, Roadhouse declared, were made the tools of the old political parties. Why? Because they were duped by their leaders, who were takirs, looking for dirty government jobs. Dan O'Donoghue was a fakir, Robert Glockling was a fakir, and Frank Plant, of London, was a fakir, and Frank Plant, of London, was a fakir. It would be found, Roadhouse went on to say, that all the so-called labor leaders—Mahon, of the Street Railway Employes' Union; Gompers, of the Federation of Labor; Shaffer, of the Amalgamated Steel Workers, and the rest of them—had at one time or another done the dirty work of the Republican or Democratic parties, just as the Canadian labor leaders did the dirty work of the Grit or Tory party. "Had they been true unionists," shouted Roadhouse, "they would have refused to handle the trains which drew the militia and the scabs to Albany to put down the strikers."
