BOOM IN STEEL STOCK Public Appear to Have Gone Wild-Prices Went Up 15 Points on Thursday.

Montreal, April 3.-The public seems to have gone wild over the Dominion Steel stock, judging by the excited manner in which the prices are jumping up. Conservative people in the market express the opinion that prices have gone far above what are warranted by the circumstances, but the buying goes on just the same. After yesterday's closing at 51, Steel, common, jumped to 57% in the first hour today; Steel, preferred, rose to 95, and the bonds to 10934. Dominion Coal rose to 134 and Montreal Power to 105.
