The News Summary

The St. Lawrence is open for business.

Three Great Northern trains blocked for four days by the blizzard in North Dakota have arrived in Butte, Mont. The regular schedule has been resumed.

A serious rock slide occurred at Levis, in the vicinity of the Grand Trunk station Thursday evening, which resulted in considerable loss of property, but no person was injured.

The L. E. and D. R. R. steel train commenced work on Wednesday, laying new steel between Blenheim and Rondan.

What brought through at that point they will work from Dresden north to Sarnia.

Fifty thousand dollars was paid by Geo. P. Blow, of Pittsburgh, at the sale of the Matheson collection of paintings in New York on Wednesday. It was for Rubens' "Holy Family," a canvas which was last sold at \$60,000. The total for the night's sale of sixty-three pictures was \$225,275.

A single-page folio of "The Charge of the Light Brigade," the original rough proof sheet corrected by Tennyson before it was printed, has been sold by auction in New York for \$400.

It was from the collection of A. J. Morgan.

The Ohio county, West Virginia, grand jury, after being in session a week, brought in indictments against ten members of the second branch of the council for solicitation of bribes from the city railway company, of Wheeling, to which a franchise was granted last week.

THE DEATH RECORD

George Knight, a British Pensioner, Found Dead on the Street.

Windsor, April 3.—George Knight was found dead on the street last evening by Mrs. Wm. Giles, of Goyeau street. Knight was a neighbor of Mrs. Giles, and hearing that he was ill on the street, she and two of her children went to look for him. His body was found lying on the sidewalk, and Dr. G. R. Cruikshank, who was called, stated that death was due to apoplexy.

The deceased was 92 years old last Christmas, and was well up to within a few hours of the time of his death. He was a pensioner, having served through the Crimean war. When he secured his discharge from the army he left England with his family and came to this city. Knight participated in the battle of Balaklava. He leaves two sons, Alfred, of Detroit, and George, of Windsor, and two married daughters residing in Detroit.

Quebec, April 4.—A. G. Bourbonnais, M.P.P. for Soulanges, Que., who had been in town since the closing of the legislature, took suddenly ill on Wednesday evening and died about 4 o'clock this morning at the Hotel Dieu.

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The Canadian Rifles especially distinguished themselves, one party commanded by Lieut. Bruce Carruthers, holding its post till every man was killed or wounded.

OFFICIAL REPORT.

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Fifteen hundred Boers participated in the engagement, but they had suffered too heavily and cleared away to the northwest and south.

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LOOKING TO STEYN.
London, April 4.—The "Times" correspondent, writing from Vaalbank, says that among some Boer papers captured on March 25 were copies of two addresses of welcome to Steyn and Dewet, signed by Delarey, Commandant Liebenberg, and others. In one of them Steyn is apostrophized as "leader and counselor," and the address continues: "We thank God for your manful and steadfast attitude. We pray that it may be granted to you to come forward at head and leader of united South Africa."

A proclamation issued by Schalk-burger in Lydenburg district ordered that March 29 be observed by the British and Boers as a day of intercession for the restoration of peace and the independence of the republics.

LEADERS LOCATED.

Kroonstad, Orange River Colony, April 3. Acting President Schalk-burger has opened negotiations with President Steyn, who has been located with Delarey and Kemp, but the whereabouts of the party has not been ascertained. Dewet has been located near Boshof.

HAD 120 FIGHTS

Dordrecht, April 3.—According to the General Dutch Alliance during December, 1901, there were 120 fights between the British and Boers in the South African Republic, 1st in the Orange Free State, 79 in Cape Colony, and 9 in Natal—a total of 208 fights in a year.

The figures for January, 1902, show 104 fights in the South African Republic, in Cape Colony 83, in Natal 2, in the Orange Free State 141, and in Swaziland, a total of 231. The list is remarkable, as showing the vast extent of territory over which the war is being conducted.

EMBARGO ON TRAFFIC.
Durban, Natal, April 3.—General traffic is closed throughout the whole country north of the Tagela River. The railway is strictly protected by lines of blockhouses extending from Ladysmith. Permits are required to enable people to proceed beyond the railway.

THE PEACE NEGOTIATIONS.
There are many rumors respecting peace negotiations, but there is little wheat among the chaff. Possibly Dr. Kuyper, the Dutch premier, has sought to interest the German Emperor in the Boer cause, but presumably he has not succeeded in doing so. There is unusual activity among Boer agents.

One of their (the Australian) officers has been murdered by Boers. Shortly afterwards the Australians captured a number of Boers, including one wearing the uniform of the murdered officer. They immediately held a drum court-martial, found the man guilty and ordered him to be shot. For this the Australians were arrested and tried by a court-martial.

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RHODES' FUNERAL.

Cape Town, April 3.—Throughout the morning a continuous stream of people passed by the coffin, which was lying in state in the cathedral. The funeral procession this afternoon was most imposing. The coffin was draped with the Union Jack, and the streets were lined by troops, who saluted the passing cortege. The pall-bearers were Dr. Jameson, Sir John Gordon Sprigg, the premier of Cape Colony, and six others.

The chief mourner was Col. Frank Rhodes, who walked alone and bareheaded, followed by the other brothers of the deceased and representatives of Lord Milner, the British high commissioner, and Sir Walter Hely-Hutchinson, the governor of the Cape.

All business was suspended during the funeral, and all the public buildings were draped in mourning. In front of the cathedral stood a huge figure of Cecil Rhodes as he stood in the archbishop and other clergy received the body at the porch.

The opening sentences of the burial service were pronounced, with bells tolling, and the organ playing a funeral march. The procession then passed down the main transept.

WAS ESSENTIALLY RELIGIOUS.

The archbishop made an address, during which he declared that Mr. Rhodes had faults, of which he, probably, was as conscious as anyone; but, nevertheless, he was a great man, and though not a great church-goer, con-

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
