tection of weak or defective eyesight, and even of nervous breakdown in school children.

Domestic Science.

"One branch of our work in which book-learning is placed after the practical work of life is domestic science. This subject has come to stay, and its methods only need to be known to the public to meet with universal approval, It might, there-fore, be well to take some special pains this year to familiarize the public with what domestic science, as taught in our schools, really means. Perhaps it would not be wise or even possible to absolutely not be wise or even possible to absolutely require our teachers to mingle more than some of them do with the children in the playground. But I certainly think that it should be constantly and strongly urged upon them as making greatly for their own health and for their good influence over the children.

Advantage of Manual Training. "The board should also keep in mind the advantage of the manual training school, now working in many cities, and to take some steps looking to the extension of this work. An immense amount of money is sent from this city every year by young men and women in payment for correspondence courses of learning in various branches of art and mechanics. I look forward to the day when all these things will be taught right here at home, so that not only may that money be left here, but many of those capable men who teach these arts may be numbered among our
