Puts Many Out of Business.

New York, May 1.-It was estimated that 500 so-called Raines' law hotels in this city went out of the hotel business today, and became ordinary saloons, without the privilege of renting rooms. This was the result of the new Prentice law, which amends the old Raines law under which many pre

tended hotels flourished. The new law prescribes that hotels must have the approval of the New York city building department as a bona fide hotel before it shall be allowed an excise license. There were about 1,300 hotels operating under the Raines law, and it is believed that not more than 800 of them will attempt to continue under the restric-

tions of the new law. The excise department declined today to issue licenses except to those hotels which made application before April 15. In consequence some of the high-class hotels were unable to secure licenses today.

It was estimated that 250 of the 12,500 saloons in this city were not opened today owing to the restrictions of the new law
